

Atomic Experts Agree to Meet

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.-(AP) East-West atomic energy experts shook hands amiably Monday and quickly agreed to hold an international scientific conference in Geneva next August as part of President Eisenhower's atoms-for-peace plan.

The opening session, probably will be on Aug. 8.

That was far as the group went on concrete decisions during a long morning meeting at which United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold presided. He opened the conference with a plea for the use of atomic energy to benefit all mankind.

Earlier Monday the Soviet Union announced in Moscow that it was turning over atomic information and fissionable materials for peaceful use to Communist China, East Germany, Poland, Romania and Czechoslovakia.

This was believed here to be Russia's answer to an American offer to give 220 pounds of fissionable material to the atoms-for-peace program and an offer by Britain to contribute 44 pounds.

The Russians announced only last Friday that they would share

with the rest of the world experience they claim to have gained by operating an industrial atomic power plant.

A Russian scientist believed to have had much to do with building the Soviet plant, Dimitri V. Skobeltsyn, was present when the scientists convened here Monday morning.

After Hammarskjold opened the meeting, the scientists of seven nations agreed that the conference should be held in Geneva, where the UN has large conference rooms and full facilities.

An invitation from The Hague was turned down with polite thanks. The date of Aug. 8 was agreed upon, subject to a final check on what other events may be taking place at that time.

The seven countries represented by scientists were the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France, Canada, India and Brazil.

The conferees went into closed session after Hammarskjold spoke. They expect to complete their work behind closed doors, with brief announcements to the public after each meeting.

Celilo Indians Ask For Appropriation

THE DALLES-(AP)-Representatives of Indian tribes which fish at Celilo Falls voted Saturday to ask Congress to appropriate \$180,000 to relocate Indians who will be displaced by The Dalles dam construction.

Thirty Indian families will have to be moved at Celilo village on the Oregon side of the Columbia river and at Spearfish on the Washington side because of railroad relocation projects planned in connection with the dam.

Attending Saturday's meeting were representatives of the Warm Springs, Umatilla, Yakima and Celilo tribes.

County Judge Ward Webber said the Wasco county court was willing to sponsor a measure in Congress asking inclusion of the \$180,000 in the appropriation for The Dalles dam.

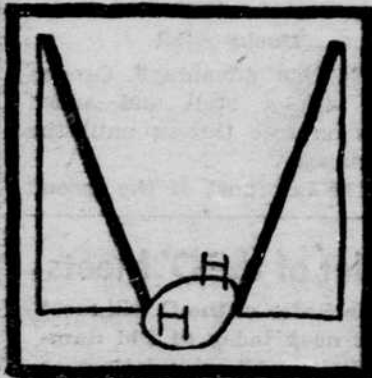

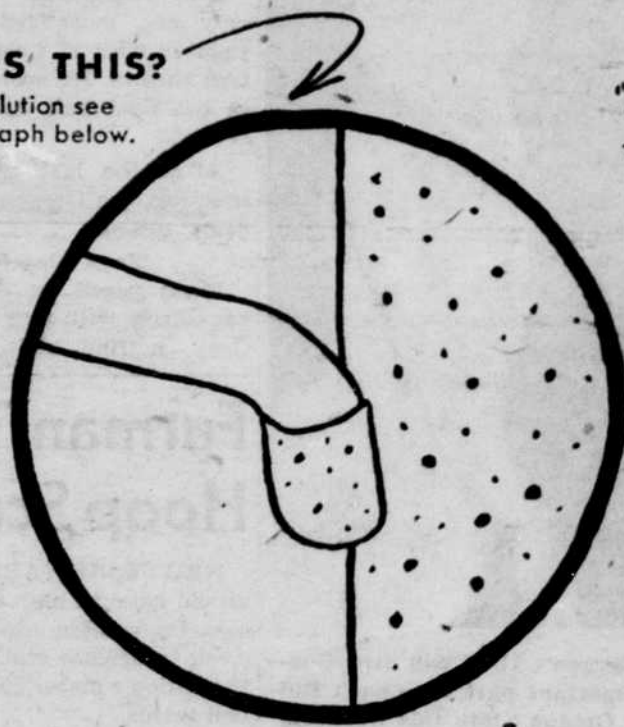
FIGURE EIGHT SKATED ON THIN ICE

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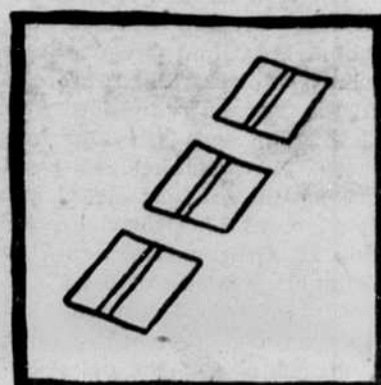
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
