

Atomic Power Runs New Sub

GROTON, Conn. (AP) — Man moved for the first time under atomic power Monday, less than 10 years after its terrifying force burst upon Hiroshima.

Under nuclear propulsion, the 3,000-ton submarine Nautilus slid smoothly from a dock at 11:01 a.m. for her first sea trials and man's first use of atomic energy for transportation.

A four word message from the bridge of the Nautilus flashed the news of the historic event.

It read:
"Underway on nuclear power."
There was no fanfare; little excitement.

To Navy men and civilian

newsmen aboard the submarine rescue vessel Skylark, lying close to the Nautilus, it seemed a routine operation.

Only an hour after the Nautilus pulled out, President Eisenhower disclosed in his budget message to Congress that three more atomic submarines are planned, bringing the size of the nuclear-powered fleet to seven.

The Nautilus pointed her bow into the sun and made for the trial area in Long Island sound. A half hour earlier she had left the fitting-out dock of her builder, the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp.

The revolutionary Nautilus, 300 feet long, and capable of circumnavigating the globe without refueling because of her atomic power plant, looked bigger than the conventional submarine.

She has none of the smoke that comes from the exhaust of diesel-engine-powered submarines. The Nautilus picked up speed quickly once it headed toward the sound at 12 knots.

Otherwise, Navy men aboard the Skylark said, there was little to hint at its vastly superior fighting and cruising powers.

Commented Capt. Slade Cutter, submarine combat hero of World War II:

"I have never seen a new ship get underway in such a routine manner."

Lumber Workers Get Pay Increase

SENECA, Ore. (AP) — An AFL union official announced Monday the signing of a new contract with the Hines Lumber Co., granting a 7½-cent hourly wage increase to workers here and at Hines, near Burns, and Ochoco.

The increase was reported last week, but company officials at the time said then that the announcement was premature.

Jim Williams, president of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers local, praised the firm for granting the increase, which had been recommended by the governors' peace panel. He said the company had decided to follow the panel's recommendation despite the fact that pine industry leaders had not agreed to be bound by the panel.

Red Status Tied To Airmen Case

TOKYO (AP)—Peiping radio Tuesday intimated that the release of 11 U. S. airmen jailed as spies was tied closely to the question of admitting Red China to the United Nations.

Peiping did not say directly, but it broadcasted comments from Indian newspapers on the recent talks between Premier Chou En-Lai and Dag Hammarskjold, U. N. secretary general, in the Red capital.

The broadcast quoted from the Assum Tribune and said:

"It points out that the convicted Americans are serving out sentences in China, having been judicially convicted of espionage."

"As such, the Chinese Premier was right in holding that the United Nations could have no jurisdiction in this case, especially as, despite its legitimate claims, the Chinese People's Republic has been shut out from the United Nations through the obduracy of the United States of America."

Oregon Senators Criticize Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon senators Monday attacked President Eisenhower's budget as "woefully inadequate" and one "which spells economic hardship and adversity for the Pacific Northwest."

Senator Wayne Morse said the budget message was "woefully inadequate to the urgent needs of the Pacific Northwest," partly because the President "failed to recommend a multipurpose dam for the Columbia River basin."

Both Morse and Senator Richard L. Neuberger criticized the President's recommendation for "partnership" construction of reclamation dams by federal and nonfederal groups.

"In the election this fall," Morse said, the people of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest voted for public comprehensive resource development. Obviously the administration is ignoring their expressed will...

"I will work in harness with Democrats from my region and others who regret that the bipartisanism which characterized public power development until

recently, has been abandoned by the present administration."

Neuberger said the budget would hurt the economy of the Northwest.

"The pledge of federal assistance for new hydroelectric development is tied specifically to the discredited partnership scheme, under which private power companies would monopolize the bulk of revenues at the dams," he added.

"This is a shotgun promise, telling the people of the region they must accept partnership or reconcile themselves to virtually no new projects at all."

"... The Bonneville Power Administration, which has been the life line of Northwest hydroelectric production, is to receive only 66 per cent of last year's budget."

"This symbolizes the gradual decline of Bonneville under the present administration, which hopes to see the great Federal agency superseded by private power companies."

Pope's Physician Refuses Red Offer

ROME (AP)—A young Italian physician, who daily prepares a nourishing potion for Pope Pius XII, said Monday he has received—and flatly refused—an invitation to work for Soviet Russia.

He is Dr. Marco Soncini, 37, of Rome. With the help of the Pope's private physician, Dr. Riccardo Galeazzi-Lisi, he has concocted a potion and diet that have helped the 78-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church in his slow recovery from a grave ailment.

The story he disclosed in an interview suggests how contact may also have been made by the Soviet Union with Italian atomic scientist, Bruno Pontecorvo, who chose to go through the Iron Curtain. Dr. Soncini, however, said "No, thanks."

He gave this account: Eight days ago, on Jan. 9, two dark-coated, dark-hatted strangers rang the bell of his small apartment in a fashionable Rome district.

The men said they had an important message. They asked

that a woman who was in the apartment be told to leave. It was necessary to speak privately, they said.

When the woman left, one of the men who spoke fluent Italian with a slight foreign accent came to the point quickly. Apparently he and his companion were well informed about Dr. Soncini's biochemical work, and also about his efforts, and failure, to obtain certain acids.

"We have all these acids in Moscow," said the spokesman, and added, "how would you like to continue your studies there?"

Dr. Soncini said he told his unknown visitors that he had no intention of leaving Italy for Russia.

Dr. Soncini asked his visitors whether they were from the Russian Embassy in Rome.

At first they demurred in answering this. Dr. Soncini insisted. The spokesman said, "Well, you could say we are for the time being attached to the embassy."

They declined to give their names.
