

C.O. Peterson to Teach Billiard Fundamentals

Charlie Peterson, world's fancy shot billiards champion, is to appear in the Student Union recreation department Tuesday and Wednesday, according to Louis Bellisimo, SU recreation director.

In addition to exhibiting his many trick shots, Peterson will offer free instruction to all interested students in three-cushion and straight-rail billiards, Bellisimo said.

Peterson has toured the college circuit since 1930 giving exhibitions, teaching and conducting the national intercollegiate billiard championship tournament. He is now traveling under the auspices of the Association of College Unions. During World War II he covered more service camps than any other entertainer, exhibiting his trick shots for the armed forces.

His fancy shots number about 550, but they are only incidental to his purpose. What he is successfully doing through his appearances, is teaching beginners that billiards is an easy game to learn and easy to play. He contends that anyone can play well with reasonable attention to

simple fundamentals.

At the age of 77, Peterson still challenges his audience at every appearance to show him a shot he can't make.

Methodists Offer Five Scholarships

The Methodist Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn., has announced five \$1000 scholarship awards for graduate students who are preparing for teaching careers.

Named the "Bishop James C. Baker Awards," the annual scholarships will be granted Methodist students who plan to teach in the church's colleges or seminaries. Stanley H. Martin, director of the board's department of student loans and scholarships, said that candidates for the awards are restricted to graduate students at state institutions because recipients will be required to serve as program leaders at their campus Wesley Foundation, the church's student center.

Applications for the awards will not be accepted after April 1. They may be turned in at Wesley foundation centers.

Bonneville Budget Allots Two Million

PORTLAND (AP) — The budget President Eisenhower proposed Monday for the Bonneville Administration, plus carryover funds, will be about two million dollars under the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year, Administrator William A. Pearl said Monday.

The budgeted \$16,456,000 for construction will be supplemented by \$10,181,000 in funds carried over from this year to make \$26,637,000 available for construction of transmission facilities next year, Pearl said.

Stock Market Gain Helps Monday Fall

NEW YORK, (AP) — Prices in the stock market bounced up Tuesday in a recovery from the hard pounding they took in Monday's break.

Gains ran through the entire market and went to around 6 points at the best with many leading issues up 2 to 4 points. Monday's losses were severe and went to 5 points repeatedly in key areas.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced \$1.30 as compared with a loss of \$3.50 revised suffered Monday. The average now stands at \$150.10. The industrial component of the average stepped ahead \$1.80, rails added \$1.40, and utilities were up 30 cents.

There were 1,271 individual issues traded of which 641 advanced and 373 declined with 15 new highs and 7 new lows for 1954-55 touched.
