Chemist Sees Hope in Algae

Mankind can support twice the world's population if efficient farm methods are used, stated F. J. Reithel, associate professor of chemistry, in the weekly browsing room lecture in the Student Union Wednesday.

In the lecture Reithel discussed the problem of the world's population increasing beyond the planet's ability to grow enough food and to supply the larger population with the necessary natural resources.

Some people believe that it is "algae-farms," bio-chemistry and chromatography, a method for separating substances, which will raise the productive capacity of the earth. He explained how "algae-farms" could be used to capture solar energy and increase food production.

"In theory," Reithel said, "the energy of sunlight is sufficient to grow algae in the comparatively desolate country of Israel."

Before coming to Oregon, Reithel was an instructor in bio-chemistry at St. Louis university school of medicine and also at

Washington university school of medicine. He has held research grants from the Atomic Energy commission and from the National Institute of Health.

Discussion leader for the lecture was A. J. Bernatowicz, instructor in biology, who has done some work in the fields which Reithel discussed.

UO Is Selected For GM Grant

The University of Oregon has been selected as one of 306 institutions of higher learning that General Motors plans to invest a total of \$2,000,000 annually to maintain and improve the quality of education.

The program includes four year scholarships to students and grants to the colleges and universities included in the program.

The first 350 students under the scholarship program will enroll as freshmen in the academic year starting next fall.

The University of Washington is the only other institution in the Northwest to be selected for participation in the program.

No school may draw more than five scholarships a year under the terms of the program.

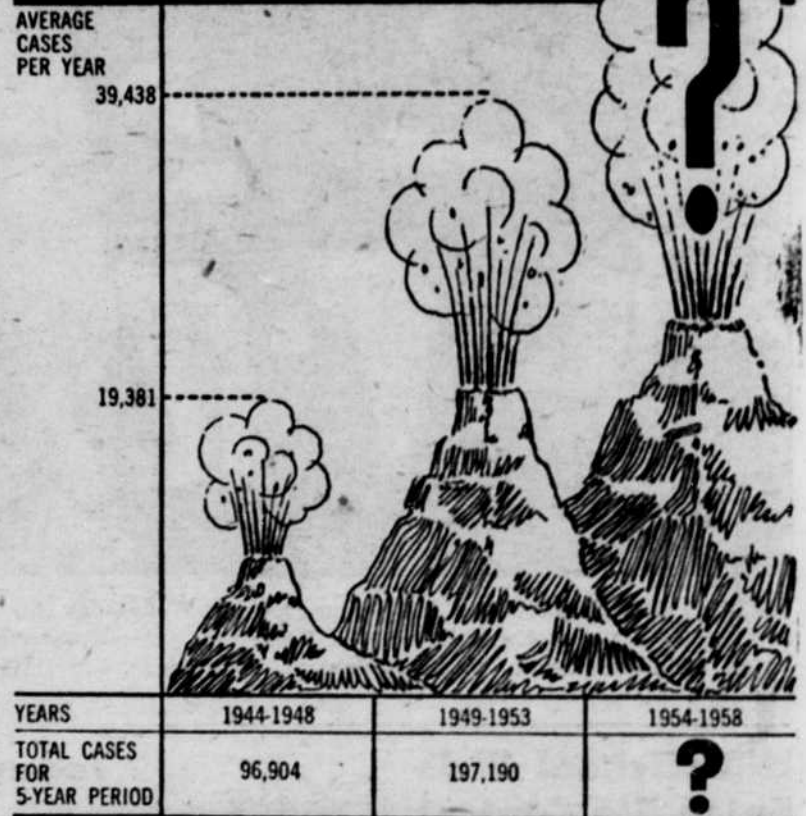
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
