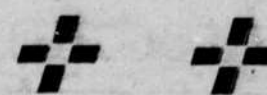


Religious Notes

Although Harris gave no indication that a ski team will be considered by the athletic department in the future, Jim Laughton, ski club president, expressed the hope that the ski team will prove itself this year and become a regular athletic department function.

The Ski club was reorganized this year and has at this time approximately 25 members. Laughton said that he plans to race in the all-Oregon meet later in the season.
