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2. Veterans were unable to complete registration because of veteran aid requirements; and

3. Many students had completed all registration steps before the next term, and therefore felt that it was not necessary to return to school the first day because other students would still be registering. Class attendance during the first week was poor, thus making it difficult for both students and professors.

When asked about the possibility of returning to the old system, Carlson said, "We'd rather see what we can do about speeding up the checking process rather than go back to the old method."

One cause of the long lines was students who failed to fill out cards properly. Corrections had to be made in the line or the student had to step out of line and complete the material properly. In either case the movement of the line was held up.

Carlson explained another cause of confusion and waiting was due to students who did not show up for their scheduled adviser-advisee meetings.

"Registration ought to provide ample opportunity for advising," DuShane stated. "The two week period for advising was one of the reasons I felt the old method of preliminary registration was preferable to this new one."

Registration procedures used by other colleges were explained by Carlson, however, none of them presented a system which would be workable here.

University of Washington hires a special crew of 15 or 20 women for five or more weeks to handle registration of approximately 12,000 persons. Students obtain an appointment card which lists the time, date, and hour that the student is to perform his registration steps. Departments have no connection with enrollment in their particular classes.

USC and UCLA students pay their fees first and then additional time is allotted for course changes and filing registration cards. It is assumed by the registration administrators that all students are taking the full course load. Fee payment is made on this basis.

The Oregon State college system is similar to Oregon's. All registration and fee payment is conducted in Gill coliseum with half the students registering the first day, the other half on the second day. Before fall term registration begins, the OSC student body president draws a section of the alphabet from a hat.

Students whose names fall within that range register first. Winter and spring term the groups rotate.

In comparing these systems to the University's method, Carlson stated that these procedures are probably quite workable for the particular college, but "we try to do the job as efficiently as possible with a minimum of extra help and expense."

The other defense line is that which runs through Nationalist-held islands on the Western side of the Formosa Strait and close against the Red China coast.

Insurance Plan Exposed in Eng.

OLDHAM, England (AP)—The scheme of two housewives who qualified for jobless insurance benefits by doing each other's washing came to light in this Lancashire town Sunday. Here's how it worked:

The two women employed each other, meeting every Monday to exchange laundry. For six months—the minimum required to qualify for unemployment compensation—they stamped each other's national insurance cards, signifying they had worked. Then the two fired each other.

For the next six months the women collected jobless benefits amounting to 26 shillings or \$3.64 per week each. Then they rehired each other and started another cycle.

A Labor Ministry official said, "I don't think there's anything we can do about it... It is probably going on all over the country."

Tobe-Coburn Offers Award

Senior women interested in careers in buying, advertising, styling and television may apply for fellowships to the Tobe-Coburn school for fashion careers in New York City.

Four fashion fellowships are being offered for 1955-1956. All senior women who will graduate before Aug. 31 are eligible to apply for the awards. Registration for the fellowships closes Jan. 31.

The fellowships cover full tuition of \$1050.

Tobe-Coburn's one year course offers contact with the fashion industry through lectures by fashion personalities, and visits to manufacturers, department stores, fashion shows and museums. Ten full weeks of working experience, with pay, are offered in New York stores and other fashion organizations.

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UN Control In Formosa?

LONDON (AP)—Fresh talk of neutralizing Formosa by placing the Chinese Nationalist-held island under the wing of the United Nations was heard in Britain Sunday.

Sections of the press of varying political shades made the suggestion—asking only whether the timing was right. It is not a new idea and has been shunned by the Chinese Reds many times in the past.

The pro-Labor Sunday Pictorial, without giving the source of its information, said:

"Sir Anthony Eden British foreign secretary has a plan to make Formosa an independent state under U.N. trusteeship, with Chiang's government remaining as a sort of custodian for the U.N."

Two Freshmen Leave College For Adventure

HAVERFORD, Pa. (AP)—Two Haverford college freshmen—sons of famous painters and illustrators, disappeared from their dormitories eight days ago "to make their own way," it was disclosed Sunday night.

College officials said they have no information on the boy's whereabouts but Norman Rockwell, famous magazine and calendar illustrator and father of one of the students, reported that he received a phone call Saturday from his son and was told he was "all right."

Fellow classmates of Peter B. Rockwell and Nicholas Hoppin, both 18, said the two youths had planned to go to Mexico "in search of adventure."

Hoppin is the son of Courtland Hoppin, New York City, a well-known creator of animated cartoons.

Rockwell, contacted at his

home in Stockbridge, Mass., declined to say where his son's phone call originated.

William Cadbury, dean at the college said that both boys departed without receiving faculty permission and both left most of their belonging behind.

He said that since they left in advance of their midyear final examinations, they would not get credit for their first half-year at college.

The elder Rockwell said his son had called to tell him he left school with Hoppin "to make their own way."

"Peter is a good boy," Rockwell said. "He'll be all right wherever he is. I have a hunch he'll return to school next fall, however."
