

Exhibits Begin Festival of Arts

The second Oregon Festival of Arts based on the theme "The American Heritage" will begin Tuesday, February 1, with an exhibit of Ivan L. Collins' collection of historic wagons in miniature in the Student Union Art Gallery and a display of color block prints of America and Japan in the Oregon Oriental Art museum.

Collins, an employee at the physical plant here at Oregon, has authentically constructed in one-eighth scale forty-five of these historic vehicles. The collection includes miniatures of the prairie schooner and the hook and ladder fire truck. The collection will be displayed in the Student Union art gallery Feb. 1 to March 10.

Also under the program of visual arts is an exhibit showing the color wood block at the hands

of Japanese and American artists. This special feature, to be shown at the University of Oregon Oriental Art museum, portrays a century of cultural changes between the two countries.

On Feb. 3, David Mark, author of the play "Captive at Large," which will be presented by the University theater Jan. 28-March 2, will lecture at 4 p.m. at the University theater on "The Struggle Against Sentimentality in American Playwriting." The current production of "Captive at Large" has set an unprecedented record of being produced five times by collegiate groups in two years. This play has not been produced on Broadway. Mark has been in the theater 32 years and has recently completed his first novel, "The Horses Are on the Track."

Fog Causes Ship Harm

COOS BAY, Ore. (AP)—Two freighters collided in heavy fog at the Coos Bay harbor entrance Monday, but damage apparently was minor.

Both ships, delayed several days by the persistent fog, were trying to creep out to sea when they banged together shortly before noon.

The George S. Long, owned by the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., suffered a hole in its bow about eight feet above the water line. The hole was about three by two feet in size.

Brockway was elected to the parliament in 1929, but lost his seat three years later when the labor party suffered an overwhelming defeat. He was politically inactive until 1950, when he was again elected to parliament.

Term Tally Tops 1954 by 11 Percent

Rhythmairs, is scheduled to entertain during intermission of the contest. They sing popular numbers as well as barbershop harmony, and have appeared all over the Northwest. The group consists of Ace Hingston, tenor; Ralph Shumm, lead; George Horner, bass, and Bill Wright, baritone.

The group is from Forest Grove, and will be the host quartet at that city's all-Northwest barbershop ballad contest in February. This is the competition in which the SU music committee, sponsors of the local contest, will enter the campus trophy winners.

Banquet to Begin RE Week Events

Tickets for the first event of Religious Evaluation week, a banquet on January 30, are now on sale at the Student Union main desk, according to chairman Stewart Johnson. Tickets are \$1.10.

The banquet will be held at 6 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom. Featured speaker will be Harry R. Rudin, Colgate professor of history at Yale university, who will deliver the RE week theme address, "Man, Religion and Society."

RE week will continue through next Thursday, with a new theme highlighting each day's speeches. "Man, Religion, and Society" has been designated as the overall theme for the entire week's program. Seven speakers have been scheduled for the program.

Rudin is a recognized authority on European relations and the problems of war and peace. Well-known author and lecturer, Rudin has been on the Yale faculty for 25 years. He has traveled extensively in West Africa, England, France, and Germany and has written two books entitled "Armistice, 1918," and "Germans in the Cameroons."

The Yale professor was born in 1898 in Center Rutland, Vermont. He was graduated from Yale in 1919, Phi Beta Kappa, and received his Ph.D. from Yale in 1931. He served on the teach-

ing staff of the Yale-in-China association in Changsha, China, from 1919 to 1921. In 1927, Rudin became an instructor in history at Yale.

He was appointed to his present post in 1946. Rudin has also served as visiting lecturer in European history at Harvard university.

At the present time he is a member of the American Historical Association and a contributor to the Journal of Modern History.

Ike Declares US Will Fight If Must

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's fight-if-we-must Formosa policy drew strong support in Congress Monday night although there was some misgivings and criticism.

Both House and Senate members expressed general approval for a resolution backing whatever may be needed to defend Formosa and the Pescadores from Communist attack and to restore peace in the area.

Could Mean War
Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore), commented:

"It could very well mean war." "The question here is whether a clear declaration of our intentions will avoid war," he said. He added that he believed Eisenhower was "well advised to come to Congress" with the proposal.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), said he thought Eisenhower's message on Formosa was essentially a good one but would have been "infinitely better if he had coupled with it a request—an order" to shut off foreign aid to any allied nation engaged in commerce with Red China.
