Nicaragua Leader Agrees to Abolish Free Border Zone

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP)—President Anastasio Somoza said Monday he had agreed to abolish immediately the Nicaraguan-Costa Rican neutral border zone where about 200 Costa Rican rebels have taken refuge.

Somoza told a news conference he agreed to end the neutral zone, set up last week to douse increasing friction between the two countries, at the request of Costa Rican President Jose Figueres.

Somoza warned he was mobilizing about 500 troops along the border to protect his country and that shedding "any drop of Nicaraguans' blood will mean war."

OAS Confers

Somoza announced his decision after the Organization of American States five-nation peace commission flew here from San Jose, the Costa Rican capitol, to confere with him.

The commission is trying to erase the last traces of Costa Rica's rebellion, now apparently crushed except for the holdouts in the buffer zone.

Meanwhile, Capt. Teodoro Picado Jr., chief of the rebel army in the uprising in Costa Rica, declared Monday night his forces "are ready to shed our blood to the last drop to liberate Costa Rica from its Communist regime."

Five Rebel Victories

Picado, in a rebel radio broadcast heard here, denounced the OAS for "biased and discriminatory actions." He said these actions forced the rebels to change their tactics after "five battle victories" over government forces.

The Nicaraguan president cautioned that removing the safety zone creates "a very dangerous situation." But he added "I am not going to act in a violent way without a thorough investigation" if an incident occurs.

He said he would not act unless there were "wounded or dead Nicaraguans in our hands."

To Pursue Rebels

Somoza said the commission told him Figueres' forces now will pursue the remaining rebels throughout Costa Rica's territory, including its 3-mile-wide half of the neutral zone.

Somoza charged last week that two of the four F51 Mustang fighter planes sold to Costa Rica by the United States had violated Nicaragua's borders. He declared Monday that if the planes fly over the frontier again, he would be forced to "rain them out with bullets."

As he spoke, two of the 25 F51s which Somoza purchased from Sweden and received crated last week at a Pacific port took to the air and flew over the capital. Officials said they were armed and flown by Nicaraguan pilots.

Store Told To Re-hire

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A National Labor Relations board trial examiner has recommended to the board that a Monroe, Ore., feed store be compelled to re-hire two employees and "cease and desist" from discouraging membership in an AFL grain millers local.

Examiner William E. Spencer found after reviewing evidence at a hearing which he conducted in Corvallis last November that the company fired two brothers, Frank and Don Harrington, last March because of union activities.

However, Spencer dismissed the union's complaint that two other employees, Ellis Conn and Jesse Howe, were discharged because of their union membership. He said evidence at the hearing did not substantiate the complaint.

Spencer recommended that the Harringtons be re-employed with compensation for any wages they may have lost.

In an earlier decision the NLRB held on Oct. 30, 1953, that the company "discharged all of its employees for organization activities," Spencer recalled. The Harringtons, Conn and Howe were among those rehired after the board's ruling.

Young Republicans Elect Blackburn

Billiard Champion Gives SU Exhibit

Exhibitions by the world's champion fancy shot cue artist, Charlie Peterson, will be given today and Wednesday at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. in the recreation area of the Student Union.

Main purpose of his two-day stay on the University campus, however, is to teach students the simple fundamentals of the game of billiards. He will be available for free instruction today and tomorrow during any of the morning, afternoon, or evening hours of the SU, according to Lou Bellissimo, SU recreation director. Lessons will be in straight-rail and three-cushion billiards, he said.

At the age of 77, Peterson continues to tour college campuses throughout the nation giving exhibitions, teaching and conducting the national intercollegiate billiards championship tournament. Since 1930 he has carried this billiard "gospel" to American colleges with gratifying results.

At each exhibition he will challenge his audience to "Show Me a Shot I Can't Make." Among his fancy shots, numbering about 550, the "dollar shot" serves as an example of Peterson's cue wizardry and skill. Peterson stands a silver dollar on end between two pieces of billiard chalk approximately one-eighth of an inch apart. He then strokes the dollar to the far cushion,

from where it rolls back through the two pieces of chalk.

Peterson covered more service camps during World War II than any other entertainer, exhibiting his trick billiard shots for the boys in the armed forces. One of his pupils, Harold Worst, then in the Navy, won the world's championship last year.
