Medford Advances To Top Prep Poll

Medford emerged clearly in front of the pack in the second Associated Press poll of the season on high school basketball.

The state's sports writers, who divided their votes for first place among six teams last week, settled strongly on Medford this week as the No. 1 team, and dropped last week's leader, Eugene, down to fourth place.

Ten of the 14 sports writers in the poll named Medford for first place. Milwaukie got three first-place votes and wound up in second votes and finished up in second place. Eugene also got one vote for first place.

In the close balloting last week it was Eugene, Medford, Milwaukie and North Bend at the head of the list. This week it was Medford, Milwaukie, North Bend and Eugene.

The rest of the list also was

shuffled, but there were no newcomers among the top 10. Albany moved up to fifth place, followed by St. Helens, Cleveland of Portland, Astoria, South Salem and Pendleton.

Eugene's tumble and Albany's rise from eighth to fifth place stems from an Albany victory over Eugene last week, 52-38. Albany also gained a dispute double-overtime win from Corvallis, 57-55.

St. Helens, the only undefeated team in the top 10, extended its winning streak to 12 straight, but could do no better than to hang on to sixth place.

Cleveland Drops
Cleveland dropped from No. 5 to No. 7 after suffering a loss at the hands of Franklin of Portland.

South Salem also tumbled, going from No. 7 to No. 9 after dropping a game to the No. 2 team, Milwaukie, the defending state champion.

Pendleton held on to the No. 10 spot by winning two more games last week.

NCAA Group Silent On Grid Problem

CHICAGO (AP) — The 1955 television committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association opened a two-day organizational meeting Tuesday in tight secrecy.

Walt Byers, NCAA executive director, said there probably will be no announcement of developments until a late afternoon news conference Wednesday.

It was expected Tuesday's opening session resulted in naming of a new chairman of the 12-man committee confronted with shaping a 1955 football TV program which will avoid threatening revolt by some members.

However, Byers said the chairman had not been selected when photographers took mid-afternoon pictures of the group.

Earl S. Fullbrook, University of Nebraska faculty representative and retiring NCAA secretary-treasurer, was said to be the choice. Past chairman Harvel Cassill, University of Washington athletic director, declined the position in order to campaign for regional television under national control.

The Pacific Coast conference and Big Ten have fought hard since the NCAA convention earlier this month for a nationally-controlled program of regional television.

DR. SALK'S STUDIES CONTINUE AS EVALUATION OF HIS VACCINE GOES ON—CURRENTLY HE IS DETERMINING HOW LONG THE EFFECTS OF THE VACCINE LAST AND HOW MANY BOOSTER INJECTIONS ARE NEEDED.

DR. SALK AND ASSOCIATES HAVE BEEN GRANTS OF \$1,486,234 FROM THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS SINCE 1949.....

THEY HAVE RECENTLY DEVELOPED A NEW COLOR TEST FOR DETERMINING THE PRESENCE OF POLIO ANTIBODY IN THE BLOOD OF VACCINATED CHILDREN—IT IS SPEEDING THE ANSWERS TO MANY QUESTIONS ABOUT THE VACCINE.

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
