

Webfoots Meet
BYU's Cougars

Shaw Drawn by Colts
As Top Draft Choice

The Oregon Webfoots move outside the Northern Division this weekend for a two-game basketball series with the Brigham Young university Cougars in Mac court before playing the final eight games of their conference schedule.

Oregon Coach Bill Borchers had his squad working on defense Thursday afternoon after a long scrimmage Wednesday. He gave his first seven players vacations

famous fast break with his rebounding. He had nearly twice as many rebounds as any other Cougar in 1954.

NEW YORK (AP)—The Baltimore Colts picked two prize packages out of the football grab bag Thursday as the National Football league attended to the pressing business of replenishing rosters while seeking a peace with Canada which would prevent further losses of manpower.

The Colts, pulling the coveted bonus pick out of a battered hat, named Oregon quarterback George Shaw as the No. 1 player in the annual draft of college players. Then, with third choice in the regular round of selection, they added bull-charging Alan Ameche, Wisconsin All-America player, to their list.

If Baltimore can sign these two players, the Colts, who haven't had much success since their return to the league, can be expected to come up with a powerful one-two air and ground punch next season.

Shaw led all college players in total offense during the past season and Ameche, a 212-pound bull of a man, shattered Big Ten rushing records.

Ameche Ready to Sign

When he learned of his selection, Ameche indicated that there won't be much trouble getting his name on a contract. But Shaw, a star in baseball as well as football, was more cagey.

He said he would not sign until after the college baseball season and then he'll listen to offers. Shaw reportedly has been offered as much as \$40,000 to play baseball.

Ameche is sitting on an offer

from a Canadian club to match any offer, but he said he'd prefer to play in the United States.

Patera, Reeve Picked

Other Pacific Northwest players picked were:

Fourth round: New York — Jack Patera, Oregon guard traded to Baltimore.

Seventh round: Pittsburgh — Harold Reeve, Oregon tackle.

During the 1954 season, Shaw, second to Larson in forward passing on the major college list, completed 91 of 196 tosses for 1,353 yards. He add-

ed 178 yards by rushing to compile the No. 1 total offense figure of 1,536 yards.

Baltimore, drawing the one free choice in the lottery which precedes the regular selections, caused some eyebrow-lifting when Shaw was selected ahead of Notre Dame's All-America quarterback, Ralph Guglielmi.

"Best in Country"

Coach Weeb Eubank explained, "We think he is the best quarterback available in the country." Guglielmi was No. 3 on the draft list.

The Washington Redskins, who have three pretty good quarterbacks, made the Notre Dame ace their first choice after the Chicago Cardinals passed him up in favor of Max Boydston, a pass-catching end from Oklahoma.

The Cards picked up Shaw's big rival, Paul Larson of California, when he went through the draft a year ago.

Borchers said he felt the regulars should be given some rest before the final month of the season, especially since the Webfoots played a tough pre-season schedule.

Borchers Names Starters

The Oregon mentor plans to start Forwards Jerry Ross and Ray Bell, Center Jim Loscutoff and Guards Howard Page and Phil McHugh against the speedy Cougars. He expects the Oregon squad to be "looser" for the BYU series after last week's defeats.

Brigham Young is a young team that is improving rapidly and currently is tied for second place in the Skyline conference with a 4-2 record. Coach Stan Watts has no seniors on the starting five, and only one, Guard Van Burgess, on the squad.

The Cougars have a season's record of seven wins and nine losses against a number of the top teams in the country. They started slowly, but hold victories over Washington, the only Northwest team they've met so far; Baylor, a pre-season favorite for the Southwest conference crown, and a good Michigan team.

In addition, the Cougars have beaten New Mexico, Denver, Montana and Colorado A & M in the conference.

Their losses have been to Colorado twice, Washington, Baylor, Western Kentucky, Murray State, Manhattan, Utah State and Wyoming.

Tebbs Standout

In Terry Tebbs, a 5' 8" guard, the Cougars have one of the best little men in the country. Tebbs has averaged more than 14 points per game so far this year and leads the team in scoring. He also has the best shooting percentage on the squad.

Brigham Young was hurt badly during their Eastern trip by the loss of Nick Mateljan, a 6' 4" forward with three previous varsity letters to his credit. Mateljan was the man responsible for starting Watt's

derson and Ed Pinegar, all 6' 4". Watts is expected to start his regular lineup of Pedersen at center, Pinegar and Benson at forward, and Tebbs and Dave Lewis at guards.

The Skyline club is known as a fast-breaking, free-shooting outfit with a screening offense similar to the one used by the Webfoots, and both teams are expected to do a lot of running.

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
