

'Captive at Large' To Begin Tonight

"Captive at Large," a new play by David Mark, opens tonight on the main stage of the University Theater. Performances include this Saturday through Saturday of next week.

Best tickets available are for next weekend, although some can be purchased for any night, according to Dick Lawson, box office manager. Tickets are one dollar each.

Daniel Krempel, instructor in speech, will be directing his first University Theater show. Krempel, who designed "Hannele" last term, says this is the first West Coast production of "Captive at Large."

David Mark, author of the play, will be in Eugene for the run of the show. A small, informal reception will be held in his honor following the opening night performance. All interested in meeting Mark should feel free to come, Krempel said.

Scott Lehner, junior in speech, plays one of the two "actors" in "Captive at Large." Lehner was seen last term as the lead in "Bernardine," and previously in "Mr. Roberts," "Anything Goes," "Brigadoon," "Forbidden Fruit," "Juno and the Paycock," "One Touch of Venus" and "She Stoops to Conquer."

Ken Kesey, sophomore in speech, plays the second actor. He was seen last year in "One Touch of Venus," and has performed several times at "Friday at 4."

Floy Louise von Groenewald, senior in speech, plays the first actress. She has been seen in "Henry IV, Part I," and "Juno and the Paycock." Loanne Morgan, senior in speech, portrays the second actress. Miss Morgan was seen last year as the queen in "Richard II," and this summer in "Anything Goes," "Club Intime," and "Sing Ho for a Prince."

Bob Chambers, senior in speech, plays the director. Chambers returns to the UT stage after a two years tour with the army. He was seen in "Born Yesterday," and "Madwoman of Chaillot."

Bruce Holt, junior in speech, plays the "man" in the production. Holt was Beaumont in "Bernardine," and had roles in "Crucible," and "Mr. Roberts."

Vic Heyden, instructor of speech, plays the producer of "Captive." Heyden, new on campus this year, teaches radio-TV writing and radio workshop courses.

Other cast members include Rita Schenk, sophomore in liberal arts; Harold Arendt, senior in history; Richard Barbour, senior in music; Dan Frank, sophomore in speech; Darrell Keeney, junior in speech, and Wesley Nelson, junior in physics.

Scenery for "Captive at Large" was designed by Krempel and lighting was designed by Howard L. Ramey, technical director for UT. Hoyt McCachren, graduate in speech, was assistant director and stage manager.
