Petition Deadline Set For Y Cabinet Offices

Petitions for elective and appointive offices in the YWCA senior and sophomore cabinets are due Feb. 7 at the Y office in Gerlinger hall.

Voting will be held Feb. 24 with YWCA members voting in the general women's elections.

Elective offices open include YWCA president, second vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. The runner-up in the presidential election will become first vice-president.

Sophomore cabinet elective positions include chairman and secretary, with the runner-up for chairmanship to become vice-chairman.

Offices Listed

Senior cabinet appointive offices are program advisers for worship, religious growth, international affairs, public affairs and service; membership chairman; house and social chairman; conference chairman; promotion chairman; publicity chairman, and sophomore cabinet adviser.

Junior advisers for next year's freshman commissions are also included in the list of appointive senior-cabinet positions.

Appointive positions on the sophomore cabinet are membership, finance, service, social, promotion, and publicity. Co-chair-

men for the duckling counseling program are also needed, as are several members-at-large.

Descriptions Available

Descriptions of each of the jobs are available at the YW office, and interested women should contact Eileen Lindblad, executive director, as soon as possible. Freshmen may petition for sophomore cabinet, and upper-class offices may be filled by women from any class.

Candidates will be interviewed by the person now holding the jobs, or other cabinet members. Those petitioning for major offices will be interviewed by the present executive officers and by Miss Lindblad.

Elton Engstrom and Kathryn Holloway, co-chairmen of the affair, described the event as a miniature meeting of the United Nations. "Around the World" will be the Fun Fest theme.

Tickets for the dinner will be sold at the Student Union main desk and the YWCA and YMCA offices, in Gerlinger hall and the Student Union, respectively.

The speaker for the evening will be L. F. Millhollen, assistant professor of education, who is in charge of the student teacher program here.

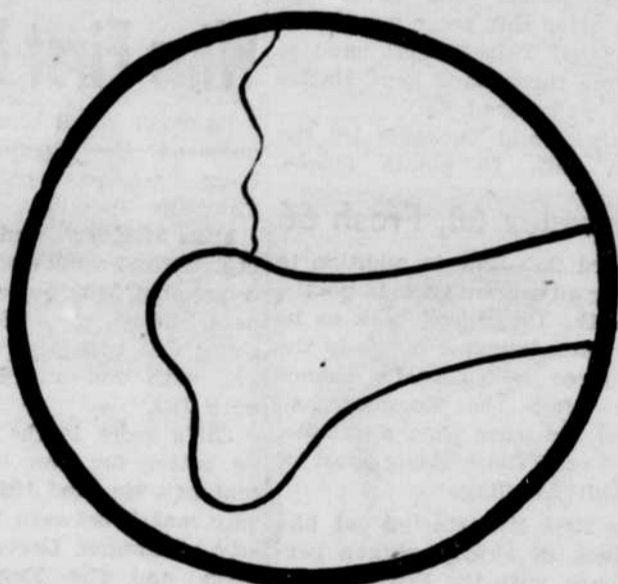
The meeting will be held in the Student Union, and all interested students on both secondary and elementary school levels, are invited to attend. Refreshments will be served.

In charge of the program are Judy Tucker, secondary, and Joan Godfrey, elementary. They are the recently-selected social coordinators.

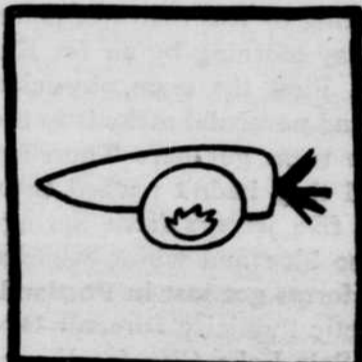
Members of Future Teachers are asked to see Mrs. Marian Taylor, assistant professor of education, in her office to get NEA and OEA magazines and papers for the past months.

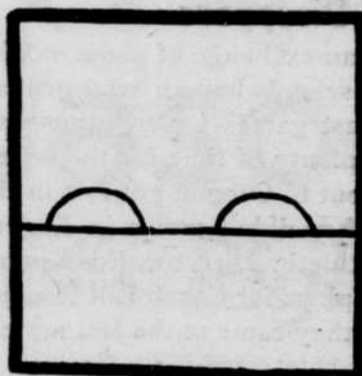

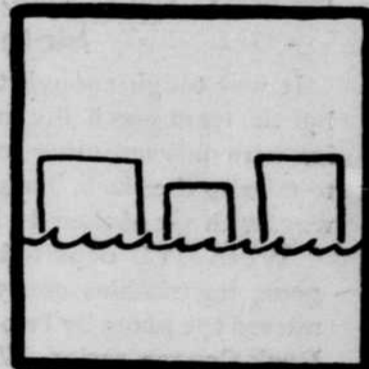

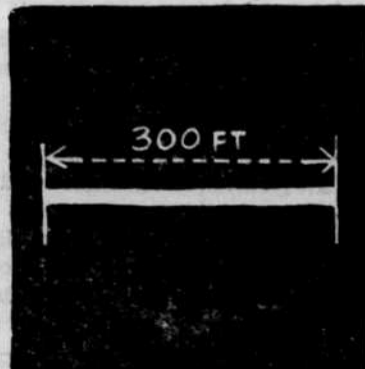
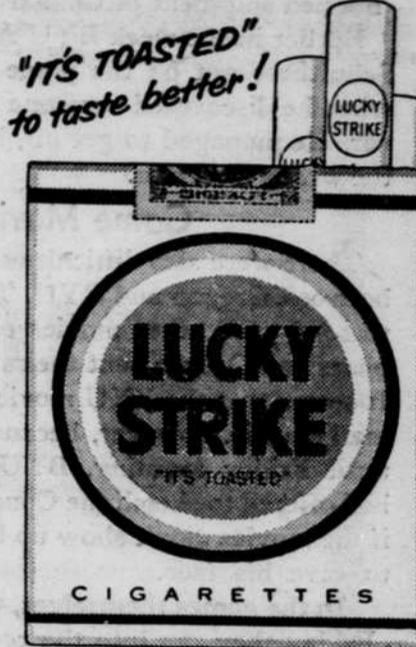
REAR VIEW OF TINY RABBIT MUNCHING ON ENORMOUS CARROT

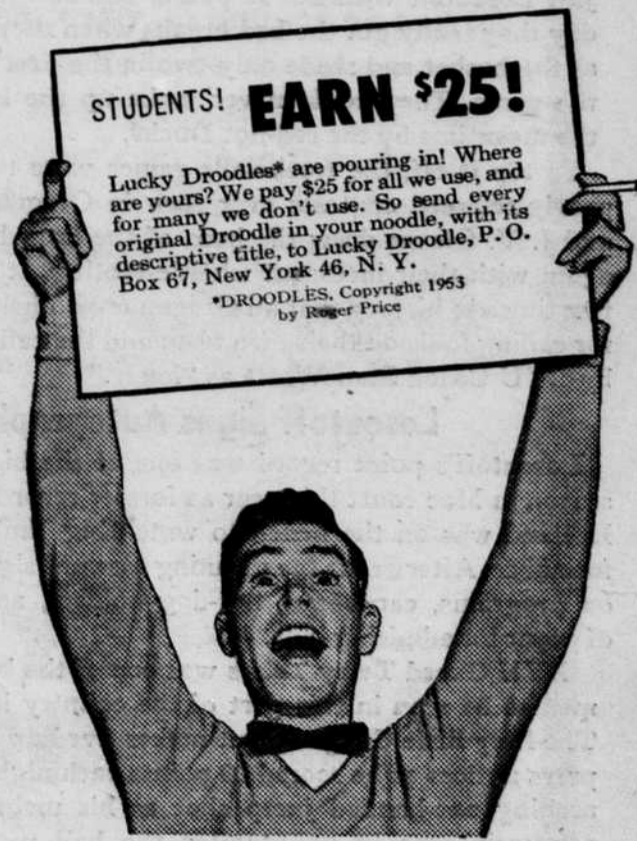
