

Ducks Sweep BYU Set

Oregon's Ducks tuned up for the tough second half of the Northern Division race Friday and Saturday as the determined Webfoots romped to two easy victories over Brigham Young university. The scores favored the Webfoots 82-71 Friday and 81-76 Saturday at McArthur court.

It was an unspectacular pair of victories for Coach Bill Borchers' Ducks as they came back in a free-wheeling fashion to get back on the win trail after dropping two tough decisions to Oregon State the previous week-end. The wins over the luckless Cougars gave the Webfoots a 10-8 record for the season.

Oregon's candidate for All-Conference honors, Jim Loscutt,

three quick baskets, two by Anderson, forged them into a sudden nine-point margin. The half ended after another exchange of baskets with the Webfoots leading 41-31.

BYU Team Rallies

In the second half the two teams played on virtually even terms with first the Ducks and then BYU rallying for several baskets. Oregon once held a 15-point lead when Loscutt and Anderson went on a spree with only three minutes gone in the period. BYU kept plugging away, however, and closed the margin to seven points with five minutes left before bowing to the Webfoots' power.

The game was full of good shots and fine plays by both

The Cougar team was an alert and fast quintet but their lack of rebound strength and 18 missed free throws hurt their cause considerably.

Ducks Raise Margin

Oregon built up a 17-5 lead after eight minutes had gone by with Loscutt, Anderson and Howard Page combining to register all the Webfoot markers. After BYU began to sink a few, the two teams played even for nearly 10 minutes. Then with three minutes left, Loscutt canned two quick ones and Jerry Ross dunked a jump shot to shoot Oregon into a 42-22 lead.

The Cougars rallied in the final two minutes, however, to cut the margin to 44-28 at halftime. Although BYU was getting its share of the rebounds during the half, it was the difference in shooting that proved the difference, Oregon connecting for a .428 mark to .205 for their Rocky Mountain opponents.

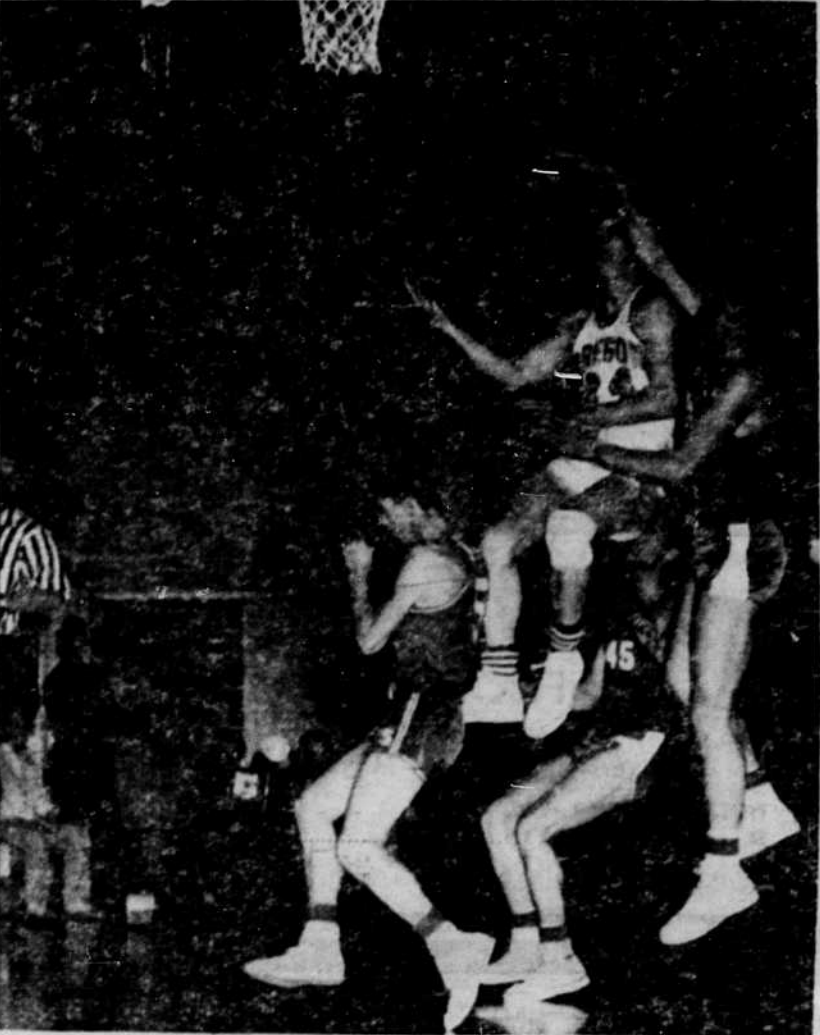
BYU came out of the dressing room a far different ballclub for the second half as Forward John

Benson led his mates in racking up 14 points to Oregon's six in the first five minutes of action. The Cougars looked like they might stage a terrific comeback but, with Oregon leading 54-45, Anderson knocked in three tip-ins within 1½ minutes to boost the Oregon lead to 15 points.

Ducks Cool Off

Oregon soon built their lead up to 19 points on baskets by Loscutt and McHugh and then weathered a big BYU rally in the last seven minutes for the first period as Oregon had a miserable .250 mark to BYU's hot .395 for the final 20 minutes.

The game was again marred by many fouls with the crowd booing several calls against both teams. Phil McHugh was the only man to foul out although several other performers were dangerously close to the disqualifying mark. Although getting only one foul called on him, Jerry Ross played a fine aggressive game for the second evening in a row after getting a starting assignment in both the BYU contests.

toff, was the big gun in leading his team to the wins. The 6'5" forward scored 35 points Friday night to set an all-time Oregon record as well as a McArthur court mark. He also broke the school's rebound record the same night as he gathered in 32 swipes.

Saturday night the grinning ex-soldier again had a big evening in the scoring column but he shared the glory with hard-working Max Anderson. Oregon's two tip-in experts each recorded 24 points in the second contest of the weekend in the greatest dual-scoring spree of the year for the Duck cagers.

Oregon now begins sharpening up for the important conference clashes ahead of them in their quest to catch the high-flying Oregon State Beavers, still perched atop the ND's top rung with eight straight wins.

Oregon 82, BYU 71

The Ducks had an easy time of it Friday night as Loscutt was the whole show for the Webfoots in their opening 81-71 win over Coach Stan Watts' inexperienced Cougars from the Skyline conference.

After jumping out into a 14-6 lead in the first five minutes with Loscutt's eight points leading the way, Oregon played BYU on even terms for the next ten minutes. The Cougars once got as close as one point behind the winners but could never catch the hard-running Ducks.

With four minutes remaining in the half, Oregon was leading by three points at 31-28 when

sides, although play got rough at times and the contest was slowed up by the whistle-blowing of Referees Bill Fouts and J. V. Glover. Only 4669 people, one of the poorest crowds this season, was on hand to watch the Webfoot triumph.

Rebounds played a big part in the Webfoot victory as the big and experienced front line of the Ducks picked 77 off the boards to set an all-time Oregon record for swipes. BYU got only 47 rebounds and Oregon's 41-24 margin at the half was a big factor in the early lead.

Old Records Broken

The new team rebound record broke the previous mark of 74 set by the Duck team of 1952 against San Jose State. Loscutt's 32 rebounds easily broke the old individual record of 26 set by Bob Peterson in 1952 and tied by Chet Noe in 1953.

Loscutt had 16 points in the first half in his quest for the all-time Oregon scoring record and the issue was in doubt until the final minutes as to whether the 227-pounder would break the mark of 32 set by Oregon Assistant Coach Barney Holland last season. Every roofer was pulling for the big boy to make it and he did so on a hook from the side with 1:45 remaining to give him 33 points. He added a short push shot before the game's end for his total of 35.

For the Cougars, star Guard Terry Tebbs was the biggest ray of light in a dismal evening as the pint-sized BYU scoring leader displayed a big variety of shots in gathering in 20 points.

Oregon 81, BYU 76

The Ducks ran up a 16-point lead at halftime over the poor-shooting BYU team in Saturday night's game and coasted in after a late rally by the Cougars for the 81-76 win to sweep the series.

Loscutt and Anderson split 48 points to lead the Webfoots in the second game of the week-end before only 4225 fans. Tebbs again led the Cougars in scoring with his second 20-point performance and was followed by Herschel Pedersen, gangly BYU center, with 19 counters.

The game started off as a romp for the Oregon five as they seemed to rack up points every time they took a shot at the basket. The Cougars, meanwhile, were having a terrible time finding the range as they went

more than ten minutes before scoring their second basket after an opening tipin by Pedersen. It took 17 shots to do it.

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Oregon remained alone in second place in the Northern Division after weekend action involving the other four league teams. The Ducks claim a 5-3 conference record.

The league-leading Beavers of Oregon State fattened their record to 8-0 by taking two games from the last-place Washington Huskies. The pre-season favorite UW five has a 2-6 slate. Idaho and Washington State are virtually tied for third, with the 4-7 Cougars holding a percentage advantage over the 2-5 Vandals.

Friday and Saturday action will find Washington at Oregon and OSC at Idaho.
