Formosa Pact 'Regrettable'

DENVER (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon said Sunday a majority of senators were "privately opposed" to President Eisenhower's fight-if-we-must-for-Formosa resolution, which he called "a complete surrender to the preventive war theory of one Admiral Arthur Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff."

Morse, one of three senators who voted against the resolution Friday night, made the statements at a press conference.

Speaking of the 85 to 3 majority by which the Formosa resolution carried, Morse told newsmen:

"The majority of senators unquestionably regretted the resolution that was before them. Had they been asked about it privately, the majority would have said no."

A few minutes later, Morse said he "will never hesitate to commit political suicide to honor my oath of office."

Morse said he believes the United States has "legal rights" in Formosa—but "not on the coastal islands" off China. He said the United Nations is the proper agency to deal with the problem.

Morse also blasted Chinese Nationalist leader Chiang Kai-Shek, saying: "Don't let anyone tell me that Chiang is a democratic leader."

Morse added: "I don't propose to risk 164 million American lives in a situation where Chiang's intrigue could create an explosion that would send the world to war. I don't trust him."

Gordon Wilson, president of the Oregon Dads' club will be the featured speaker during the half-time.

A special section will be reserved upstairs for the students and their dads. General admission tickets for dads can be obtained when registering for the weekend.

Income Tax Cut Becoming Favored

WASHINGTON (AP) —House Majority Leader McCormack (D-Mass) said Sunday "strong sentiment" is springing up among Congress members for action this year to cut everybody's income taxes.

And Rep. Boggs (D-La), a member of the taxwriting Ways and Means Committee, flatly predicted a general income tax cut will clear the house before June.

Boggs and other committee Democrats first suggested two weeks ago that they should drive for a tax cut this year instead of waiting until 1956 as planned earlier.

It was learned from other sources that Democratic members of the Ways and Means Committee discussed the act-now plan informally at a private conference with McCormack and House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex).

One participant said although no final decisions were reached, there appeared to be surprising enthusiasm for early action.

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UO Men Can Register For Draft in Eugene

College men do not have to register with their local selective service board, but can register at the board nearest the college or university at which they are attending, according to the Oregon state headquarters of the selective service.

A considerable number of college students have recently inquired as to whether they must return to their local board to register under the Universal Military Training and Service Act of 1951, or if such registration can be accomplished at the local board near the college.

The following information has been released by the department concerning this problem:

1. Generally speaking, every male resident of the United States must register within five days following his 18th birthday, except non-quota immigrants who have been permitted temporary entry for the purpose of study at an accredited college or university.

2. A registrant need not register with the board of his permanent residence. He can register at any board in the United States, but should advise that board of his place of permanent residence. His registration will then be forwarded to the local board of jurisdiction by the board which registers the individual.

3. If no local board exists in the area in which the registrant is located, he may register with a registrar who has been appointed for that purpose.

University of Oregon students can register in Eugene with Local Board No. 13, at Room 203 of the Armory or in Junction City with Christian Hasle, 235 W. 6th street.
