Professor, Priest to Talk On Religion, Government

Main speakers on today's Religious Evaluation week program will be Frank G. Williston and the Rev. Martin Thielen.

Williston, professor for the Far Eastern Institute at the University of Washington, will give the 3 p.m. address in the Student Union dad's lounge. His topic will be "Christianity's Future in the Far East."

An authority on the Far East, Williston's special fields of study have been Japan, China and Korea. He is a well-known lecturer

as well as a radio and television commentator.

Educator Speaks Tonight

Father Thielen will speak at 8 p.m. in the SU dad's lounge on "Religion in Government Affairs." The speaker is director of education on the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Portland.

The religious educator served as principal of Central Catholic high school in Portland from 1949 to 1951 when he was appointed to supervise the Catholic schools in the Portland area. He

was ordained a priest in Rome in 1935.

Each address is scheduled for 40 minutes with a 10 minute question period following.

Today's program is a continuation of Monday's general theme "Personal Religion at Work in the World and the Nations." Other events scheduled for today include a forum from 4 to 5 p.m. and dinners and fireside discussions in living organizations from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

A faculty luncheon at noon in the faculty club will honor Edwin Halsey, instructor in religion and humanities at Reed college, and Williston.

Chapel meditations will be held each day at 7:30 a.m. in the alumni hall in Gerlinger.

Smith to Present Lecture at 1 p.m.

'Marvelous Century' Subject of Educator

T. V. Smith will lecture on the subject of "Our Marvelous Century" today at 1 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom.

Smith, who is sponsored by the University Assembly Committee and is speaking in connection with Oregon's Festival of Arts, holds four honorary degrees from the University of Texas and holds the unusual position academically of Professor of Philosophy, Poetry, and Politics at the Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship, at Syracuse university.

During his term in the United States House of Representatives, he served as chairman of the Illinois Legislative Council, through which all bills had to pass before being presented to the House. He also served as a colonel in the military government division during the second World War.

Dr. Smith is one of the most eloquent spokesmen for democracy in America and is in much demand as a lecturer. Perhaps he is best known for his work as editor of the Journal of Ethics and as the author of "Beyond Conscience" and "The Philosophers Speak for Themselves," two of his many books.

Wednesday morning's chapel meditation, to be held in the second-floor lounge of Gerlinger hall, will be given by the Reverend Russell B. Staines, rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal church in Seattle.

The service, held daily from 7:30-7:50 a.m. during Religious Evaluation week, will be opened tomorrow by Reverend Robert Ellis, adviser to Canterbury club, who will introduce Rev. Staines.

This morning's speaker was Rabbi Julius Nodel of Temple Beth Israel in Portland. The Monday service was conducted by the new adviser of Westminster house, Rev. Stanley Barlow.

The twenty-minute meditation services will be held every morning this week through Thursday and are designed to supplement and tie in with the other Religious Evaluation week events.

Religious Man's Needs Emphasized By Rudin

The religious man must be intelligent and informed about the world in which he lives, Harry R. Rudin, professor of history at Yale university, told his audience Monday afternoon.

Approximately 75 persons heard Rudin give the first in a series of eight addresses scheduled for Religious Evaluation week. General theme of the week is "Man, Religion, and Society."

Rudin said that the individual cannot be content to be merely religious. Unintelligent religion has caused the majority of problems in recent history of our civilization.

"We are involved in world affairs as Americans, as intelligent men and as religious men," the Yale professor stated. "We should be informed about the people of Asia, Africa and Europe and what they think of America."

The religious man must have facts and a hard-headed approach to reality. Unproved assumptions are dangerous in these times, Rudin declared.

Much anti-communism today is based not upon facts and intelligent analysis, but upon emotionalism, the speaker explained. It's much easier to become emotional about communism, he said.

Rudin told his audience that the religious individual influences world affairs. The uninformed man is unaware of his own influence, he said.

Freedom Asked For Educators

Universities, if they are to survive, must acknowledge the need of allowing professors to represent different points of view, Edwin Halsey, instructor of religion and humanities at Reed college, said in a Dad's room lecture Monday.

The undergraduate today no longer approaches religion as an outmoded and useless study, but as a question of vital interest to him, the RE week speaker said. Because of revival of interest, it is important that religion should not be taught as merely a recital of the history of dogmas.

Even during the year of religious scepticism before the war religion was not missing from the campus, Halsey said. Instead, it was replaced by a religious attitude toward science and reason. This attitude Halsey termed "Scientism."

Scientism, he said, rested on the belief that the laws of nature have been the same in all ages. But this belief also must include the idea that human nature has changed immeasurably since Biblical times, since it has been only in the last century that people have depended on reason as a basis for explaining their world.
