

Sabine to Choose Contest Candidate

Dean Gordon A. Sabine of the school of journalism of the University of Oregon will select a candidate from the journalism school to enter a contest to find the most outstanding journalism student in the country.

This contest is sponsored by the Foster Parents' Plan for War Children. More than fifty editors and twenty-five deans of journal-

ism schools will help make the selection from among candidates being submitted after a "working assignment" and test in twenty-five U.S. cities, including Eugene. Alton F. Baker, Jr., managing editor of the Eugene Register-Guard, is the judge in Eugene.

The national winner of the contest will be paired with a leading foreign news reporter and flown to Europe on an assignment from his home town newspaper to get a story on the destitute war children in four countries there.

This contest is planned as a salute to the news gatherers of the nation for their editorial support to the work of the Foster Parents' Plan for War Children, according to Mrs. Lenore Sorin, associate director of the plan.

The Foster Parents' Plan for War Children provides individual relief for destitute children through a foster adoption plan. Individuals and groups contribute \$15 a month toward the support of children in Belgium, England, France, Greece, Holland, Italy, West Germany and Korea. As a foster parent, the donor receives regular mail, a photograph and case history of the child. The plan translates the letters as they are sent to "foster child" and "foster parent."

F. J. Hunter to Discuss Early American Stage

"The Patriotic Dialogue in Early American Theater" is the topic of the discussion to be presented by Frederick J. Hunter, assistant professor of speech, Wednesday night at 7:30 p.m. in the browsing room of the Student Union.

Assisting Hunter at the lecture will be four University students in costume, who will read

parts from Mercy Warren's "The Motley Assembly." These students are: Helen Adams, graduate in theater; Jon Powell, graduate in theater; Bruce Emmons, junior in speech, and Gail Monte, freshman in English.

The period of American theater to be covered by Hunter is from 1714 to 1778. Several previously unpublished plays or plays of which only one copy has been in existence will be used for illustrations by Hunter.

Discussion leader for the lecture will be R. D. Clark, head of the speech department and assistant dean of the college of liberal arts.

Hunter's lecture is being given in conjunction with the University's second Festival of Arts, built around the theme "The American Heritage." The remaining browsing room lectures of the term are all part of the Festival program.

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. (AP) — General Electric company announced Monday it will enter into a contract with Washington State college to study installation of a nuclear research reactor.

R. D. Eldred, sales manager for the company's atomic power equipment component, said the contract will be the first phase of an overall program designed to have a reactor working at WSC within two years.

Harold M. Dodgen, director of the nuclear reactor project for the college, is directing the program.
