

Second Festival of Arts Will Commence Today

Oregon's second biennial Festival of Arts opens today with a lecture by T. V. Smith at 1 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom. Smith will speak on "Our Magnificent Century" as part of the literature of aesthetics program of the festival.

The Festival of Arts is a program designed to co-ordinate under one theme the various fine arts. This year's festival theme is "Our American Heritage."

Museum Opens Japanese Print Exhibition Today

A display of Japanese block-prints in color, designed to point out how Japanese and American life and art has become intermingled, will open today in the Museum of Art in connection with the opening of the Festival of Arts.

The display explains the process through which a number of successive blocks, each adding a new color, go together to make the final print. Some of the tools, including knives used to cut the block, brushes used to apply the paint and the hand disk for printing the picture, are included in the display.

The prints were made by five American artists, who became interested in the Japanese prints early in the 20th century. They went to Japan to study the art of woodcut printing.

The five were Bertha Jacques, Helen Hyde, Bertha Lum, Elizabeth Keith and Charles W. Bartlett. Comparative works of each are included in the exhibit.

The display will remain on exhibit at the museum through March 14. The building is open from 1 to 5 p.m. seven days a week.

Recruiters Sign Many

PORTLAND (AP) — Youths flocked into the Army and Navy recruiting offices Monday to try to sign up before the midnight deadline on benefits under the GI bill.

Youths enlisting from now on will not be entitled to all the benefits, unless Congress passes new legislation.

The Army office, which normally handles about 10 youths a day, had enlisted 60 before noon. That office stayed open to midnight to try to handle the turnout.

Recruiters said enlistments through the month were heavier than normal. The Marines and Air Force filled their quotas early in the month. The Army signed up about 380 before the closing rush, and the Navy 300.

The program includes lectures, concerts and exhibits in the fields of visual arts, dance, music, theater, motion pictures, and literature and aesthetics. The festival, which opens today, will continue until March 11.

Vehicle Exhibits

In the visual arts field, the program includes the exhibit of miniature vehicles now on display in the SU art gallery; an exhibition of color block prints of America and Japan in the Museum of Art; a lecture by Donald Goodall on Feb. 9 in the browsing room; an exhibition of Pacific Northwest sculpture ranging from prehistoric to contemporary sculpture, and a lecture on the Adams Memorial by Augustus St. Gaudens on Feb. 17th in the browsing room.

Also included in the visual arts program will be a lecture on the history and practices of stoneware by Marguerite Wildenhain, and lectures and demonstrations by Miss Wildenhain on pottery and a lecture on "The American Heritage in Architecture" by Marion D. Ross on Feb. 27 in the browsing room.

Concert by Draper

The dance program will include a concert by Paul Draper, famous American comic dancer, on Feb. 8 in Mac court, a lecture on "Dance in the American Culture" by Marian Van Tuye on Feb. 14 in the SU ballroom, and a lecture-demonstration on "Folk Dance in America" by Lloyd Shaw on March 8, in the SU ballroom.

Included in the music program are a lecture-concert on American folk songs by Peter Seeger on Feb. 15 in the ballroom, a

concert by the University Madrigal Singers on Feb. 22, at the music auditorium, and a lecture-recital, "American Heritage in Music," by George Antheil on March 3, also in the music auditorium.

Besides the opening lecture today, the literature and aesthetics program will include a lecture by Leslie Fiedler on "American Criticism in Mid-Century" on Feb. 11 in the Dad's room, a lecture on Lincoln on Feb. 28, and a browsing room lecture, "The American Heritage in Aesthetics" by Stephen Pepper on March 2.

Theater Lecture Wednesday

The theater program includes a lecture, "The Patriotic Dialogue in Early American Drama," by Frederick Hunter tomorrow night in the browsing room, a lecture on "The Struggle Against Sentimentality in American Playwriting" by David Mark. Mark is author of the current University theater production "Captive at Large" and the UT production of "The Contrast," the first comedy written and produced in America, which will run March 4, 5, 8, 9 and 10.

The motion picture program will open Sunday with four early films shown in the SU ballroom. The Covered Wagon will be shown in the SU ballroomC k shown Feb. 9 in 138 Commonwealth. Other movies following the theme of the festival will be shown for the Sunday ballroom movies and on Wednesday evenings in Commonwealth hall during the festival.

Except for the Draper concert and some of the movies, the festival events will be free.
