Freshman Scoring Led by Tucharadt

Averaging 15 points a game, 6' 5" forward-center Paul Tucharadt still holds a wide margin over his nearest competitor in Frosh basketball scoring. His total of 105, on 43 field goals and 19 free throws, put him 42 points ahead of Dave Wanaka, who got 21 over the weekend to move into second place.

Tucharadt also holds the lead in rebounding with 72, but Hal Duffy collected 33 against Martin Signs and Fernandez Loggers and is close behind with 64 recoveries.

The Ducklings took two more on the chip last weekend, losing 60-54 to Martin Signs of Eugene on Friday and 68-66 to Fernandez Loggers of Longview Saturday night.

Next games for the Frosh are Marion Motors of Salem and Clark Junior college. Both games are slated as preliminaries to the Oregon-Washington contests Friday and Saturday night.

Elgin Baylor, the point producer from College of Idaho, rolled his average up to 25.9 tallies per tussle and swiped the lead in the Northwest basketball scoring race this week from Don Porter of Linfield.

Porter still topped him in total points, 463 to 389, but the Linfield Luger's average was 25.7—a slight gain over the previous week but not enough to hold off the Baylor challenge. Norm Hubert of Pacific ranked third on the basis of average score with 25.2.

After this bunched trio there was a sharp drop to Ted Schadewitz of Eastern Oregon College, who ranked fourth with 22.5. Seven players in the area are averaging 20 or more points a game.
