# AWS Exec Council Revises Constitution

Members of the executive council of the Associated Women Students Thursday night approved a revision of the AWS constitution which is to be presented to women students for final vote at elections Thursday, Feb. 24.

Janet Wick, AWS president, presided at the meeting of the council which includes the members of the AWS cabinet and the presidents of Mortar Board, Phi Theta Upsilon, Kwama, YWCA, WRA and heads of houses.

Major changes in the constitution concern the providing for an AWS activity board to assist the office of student affairs in coordinating women's activities and keeping a record of individual

participation, and the addition of Panhellenic, co-ed co-op council and AWS activities board presidents to the executive council.

Since the organization has become a member of the national organization of AWS, an inter-collegiate AWS representative is named in the constitution as a member of the AWS cabinet. The names of the offices of sergeant-at-arms and reporter will be changed in the constitution to historian and editor, respectively.

The complete text of the revised constitution must be printed at least twice in the Emerald before the balloting, Feb. 24. Miss Wick also announced a meeting of the senior members of the council for approval of the slate of AWS officers Thursday, Feb. 9 at 6:30 in the Student Union.

## Portland State to Have No Campus

SALEM (AP)—The House Education committee Thursday wrote into a Senate-passed bill an amendment forbidding future expansion of Portland State college into a campus-type institution.

The committee unanimously approved the bill after approving the amendment, proposed by Rep. Wayne R. Giesy, Monroe.

The Senate bill would give Portland State college authority to grant degrees, but no date is fixed. The college now is an extension center of the State Division of Higher Education.

The House probably will consider the bill next Monday or Tuesday.

## Rally Board Spots Open

Positions on the 1955-56 rally board will be filled by petition within the next two weeks, according to Betty Anderson, rally board chairman.

Open spots on the board include publicity chairman, special events chairman, secretary-treasurer, and rally chairman.

Petitions must be turned in by Feb. 15, according to Miss Anderson. Standard ASUO petition blanks should be used in applying, and should be turned in to Miss Anderson at Kappa Kappa Gamma or the ASUO petition box on the third floor of the Student Union.

Although it is not required, petitioners are requested to indicate which position on the board they want.
