Mlle. Contest Deadline Set

Mademoiselle has announced its annual college fiction and art contests with deadlines set for March 1.

The two winners will receive \$500, and the stories, illustrated by the art contest winners, will be published in Mademoiselle. Honorable mention awards will go to the runners-up in each contest with the possibility that the works will be published in Mademoiselle at a later date. Any woman under 26 years of age who is enrolled in a college, junior college or art school is eligible to compete.

Those wishing to enter the fiction contest should type their entries on regulation size typing paper, double spaced on one side of the paper only. Stories should be approximately 2500 to 5000 words in length and should not have been previously published in a commercial publication. No limit on the amount of stories that can be submitted by one person has been set.

All work, clearly marked with the contestant's name, age, home address, school address, and school year, should be enclosed with a self-addressed and stamped manila envelope. Questions and entries should be addressed to the College Fiction Contest, Mademoiselle, 575 Madison Ave., New York 22, New York.

A maximum of five samples, no larger than 8½ by 11 inches and of any medium, may be submitted by a contestant in the art contest. Photography, either black and white or color trans-

parencies, may be submitted. All entries should be unmatted, unmounted and unframed, and clearly marked with the same information as the fiction entries. The entries should also be accompanied by a manila envelope, self-addressed and stamped. The address is Art Contest, Mademoiselle, 575 Madison Ave., New York 22, New York.

Winners of the contests will be announced in the August issue of the publication.
