### University Not Threatened By Portland State College

State college as a four-year institution with degree-granting power will not have much effect on the enrollment of the University of Oregon. This is the opinion of University President O. Meredith Wilson.

Wilson said in an interview Wednesday that there are two main reasons why the new school will not be bothersome to Oregon. First, the "desire by most Portland students to go away from home for their college education will continue to prevail," he said. "And second, people who attend the new school will be mostly persons who otherwise wouldn't be able to afford a college education."

Students Won't Change

Wilson indicated that he thought only a few current University students-whose homes are in Portland-would change institutions just because they can now get a degree in their home

Portland State was granted the 'four-year privilege" only recently by the state legislature. The action was taken under a bill proposed by Sen. Rudie Wilhelm, Portland attorney, and amended slightly by the House education committee. As passed,
