Foreign Correspondent Lectures Today at University Assembly

Surindar Suri, foreign corresondent, lecturer and author from India, will speak at today's University assembly at 1 p. m. in the Student Union ballroom.

The correspondent will speak in the situation in India today. He is at present employed as a reporter by several Indian periodicals, including "Independent India," in Bombay, and "Mysindia" ih Bangalore. He writes on American and on international affairs for these magazines. Suri is also a research consultant in East Asiatic studies at the University of California.
