

John Borchardt's Webfocts have a 1-3 record going into the Husky event, having lost twice with both teams generally rising to Oregon State and once to the Washington State Cougars. The Ducks beat Idaho for their only

A feature of the UW-UO event should be the 1500-yard freestyle contest with Harry Fuller of the Webfoots meeting a Husky ace. Fuller is also expected to show strongly in the 440-freestyle against Larry Dalrymple of Washington, a prime threat for division titles.

Max Anderson, who has always had good luck in defending against Halbrook, will probably get the assignment of guarding the Swede both nights. The 6' 7" Duck star has been a rival of Halbrook since high school days in Portland and has been able to hold him down below his usual average.

Behind Halbrook, though, the Beaver five has many seasoned and usually-underrated performers. This fact was demonstrated in the first Oregon series, when Halbrook was under a suspension the first night and saw only a quarter of play the next night. Forward Tony Vlastelica, still the point leader over the entire season, led the Staters with 24 points in the first game and little Ron Robins dumped in a twohander with seconds to go for the overtime win.

State are Forward Jay Dean, a rugged rebounding junior at 6' 5"; Guard Bill Toole, who sparked the Beavers in the Washington series; Center Tex Whiteman, a capable "pinchhitter" all season; Guard-Forward Reggie Halligan, probably the best-driving player the Beavers have, and another 7footer, Phil Shadoin.

> Another factor in favor of Oregon is that the Beavers will probably be looking ahead to the playoff games with tough UCLA, rather than concentrating wholly on the Webfoots, figuring to take them in stride. Their unbeaten string was shattered by WSC last weekend and they no longer have to fight to remain undefeated.

Loscutoff and Halbrook have never played against each other except for the short time in the second game earlier this season and it should be quite a meeting. The Duck stalwart will be completing his college career while Halbrook is at the peak of his season, having dumped in over 30 points on two recent occasions.

Finishing their collegiate careers will be seniors Page and Loscutoff, while Vlastelica, Whiteman, Halligan, Robins, Ron Fundingsland, Toole and Johnny Jarboe will be playing their last Northern Division game, all being seniors also.

Capacity crowds are expected for each arena for the games. The first two games drew 10,000 people at McArthur court and 11,500 at Gill coliseum.
