Noted Poet Speaks At UO Assembly, Forum on Tuesday

Earle Birney, professor of English at the University of British Columbia, will speak at a University assembly in the Student Union ballroom at 1 p.m. Tuesday.

His topic will be "Canadian Poetry Today-Neglected Stepchild." Birney is a well-known Canadian poet who has had several volumes of poetry and one novel published. He has also received several writing awards, including the Stephen Leacock Award for Humor in 1948 and first prize in the International Poetry Awards in 1951.

Birney's poetry is noted for its quality of humor and its description of the Northwest.

Wilson Slams Salary Report

Wilson predicted that the state legislature will not accept the report, which is a survey of state jobs done by a New York firm to determine a new salary sched-
