"Don't Add Irritation

"Give them a line," Dull suggested, "and say don't cross it but do not try to add to the emotional irritation. Meanwhile, wait for the hatreds to cool."

Dull maintained that the Reds do not really want recognition or membership in the UN and said that he did not want to see them in the UN because he doubts whether Mao would obey the rules of the organization.

Stronger Organization

"The eventual answer," Dull said, "if it can ever be realized, is recognition and admission to a stronger international organization which would enforce its rules."

J. V. Berreman, professor of sociology, advocated recognition of Red China. He maintained

"The Chinese communist government is firmly in control of the Chinese mainland.

"Chiang Kai-Shek's nationalist government is a lost cause. Nothing short of war, with US intervention, could put him back in power. The Chinese people overwhelmingly turned against the Nationalists.
