2500 Entries Clash In Willamette Relays

Oregon's 20-man entry will be part of the horde of some 2500 track and field performers from 22 colleges and 101 high schools that will take part in the fifth annual Willamette Relays Saturday.

Coach Bill Bowerman's Duck team will be among the favorites in several events with strong entries in nearly all the college running events as well as individual field events.

Among the features at the relays will be the college invitational 100-yard dash, the high hurdles and the college distance medley.

Speedsters in Century

Stars entered in the 100-yard event, all of whom have run it in under 10 seconds flat, include Oregon's Bruce Springbett, double winner in the dashes against Willamette last week; Bob Gary, Washington State sprinter; Walt Hill, Seattle Pacific, and Caley Cook, Lewis and Clark.

Top men invited for the high hurdles are Ken Mischall, Mather Air Force base, Calif., defending champion in the event; Ernie Warren, Oregon State's top harrier man; Dean Benson, highlytouted hurdler from host Willamette, and Dave Klicker, unattached.

Oregon's four-star entry in the distance medley will be one of the top relay teams at the meet. NCAA defending champ Bill Del- Fain's Bad Knee linger will run the mile leg of the medley for the Ducks with Worries Tigers 34 mile portion, Australian 883 champ Jim Bailey going the 1/2 mile and Gordon Dahlquist running the 440.

All ND Schools Enter

All five of the Northern Division schools will be entered in the relays, which should give some indication of their relative strengths. Washington State and Idaho will be taking part for the first time.

Other college entrants include Linfield, Pacific, Lewis and training camp this season.
