Model Buildings To Be Exhibited

An exhibition of photographs and models illustrating "Building in the Netherlands 1945-1953" is being shown in the gallery of the art and architecture building. The exhibit, which will close April 14, is sponsored by the American Institute and the Smithsonian Institute.

The exhibit demonstrates the blending of progressive tendencies with traditional elements characteristic of Dutch postwar architecture. It portrays the challenge overcome by Dutch architects in rebuilding their cities and industries which were destroyed by World War II. It has been prepared for showing in the United States and will give examples of the diversity and high

quality of Holland postwar building.

The exhibition was planned by W. Van Gelderen and is being presented throughout the U.S. under the protection of the Netherlands embassy.
