Oxnam Talks At Assembly

Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, head of the Methodist church in the Washington, D.C. area and one of the nation's leading churchmen, will discuss "The Nature of the Contemporary Crisis" at a University assembly today at 1 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom.

Oxnam was a central figure in the 1953 controversy over Communists in the American clergy. Representative Donald L. Jackson accused him of "serving God on Sundays and the Communist front the rest of the week," in a charge made from the floor of the house which touched off the short-lived

investigation of the American

Testifying at his own request before the House Un-American Actvities committee, Oxnam asked that the inaccuracies and misrepresentations about him be withdrawn, declaring that he had never knowingly associated with a Red-front group. The committee cleared the Bishop and reported "no record of any Communist party membership or affiliation by Bishop Oxnam."

In 1954 Oxnam again drew fire from the committee when Harvey Matusow, self-styled former Communist, named Oxnam as a leading member of Red front groups. Oxnam was again cleared in February of this year when Matusow retracted all his previous testimony, saying that it had all been lies

WCC President

President of the World Council of Churches from 1948 to 1954, and a former president of De-Pauw university, Oxnam is president of the board of governors of Westminster Theological Seminary and chairman of the Methodist Commission on Chaplains.

Before he became bishop of the Washington area, Oxnam served as bishop of the Omaha, Boston and New York areas. He also served on the National War Labor Board as a special mediator in labor disputes, and was a member of the President's Committee on Higher Education.

Eight College Begrees

Oxnam, who holds eight college degrees, was awarded the Cross of the Royal Order of Phoenix by the Greek government, and a citation for meritorious personal service from the US Navy in 1947.

Author of the book "I Protest," Oxnam has also written widely on clerical subjects.
