Time Limit Set ROTC Seniors

The Department of Army has announced that Army ROTC seniors who will be commissioned in June must be ordered to active duty within 24 months. This is a change from the previous time limit of 12 months.

Every commissioned ROTC graduate, except those who qualify for Selective Service classifications I-C or IV-A as veterans of prior military service, will be ordered to active duty for two years. Veterans will become members of the U.S. Army Reserve.

Unless the ROTC officers volunteer for entry to duty later than 12 months following their graduation, they will be ordered into service in equal monthly groups during the year beginning July 1, 1955. When a graduate requests a delay until after July 1, 1956, he will be given priority, quotas permitting.

Graduates will attend a three month refresher course at their respective service schools before being assigned to Army units.
