

# Jacobson to Observe Nepal Teacher Training Program

Paul Jacobson, dean of the school of education, left Monday for Nepal where he will survey the teachers training program underway there. This program resulted from a contract which the University signed last October with the United States Foreign Operations Administration for the training of 1500 school teachers.

The contract with the South Asian country covers a three year training period and grants running expenses of \$220,000. Also a part of the agreement is the establishment of a four-year degree granting teachers college.

Jacobson will be in Washington, D.C., for four days discussing the contract and its possible expansion with FOA officials. While there he will also talk to Hugh Wood and Clarence Hendershott. He will return to the campus on June 9.

Wood, who is professor of education on campus, has spent the

past year in Nepal where he was the university's field representative on the project. He helped the Nepalese Ministry of Education in setting up the teacher training courses. Hendershott was chief of the Southeast Asia branch of FOA.

While Dean Jacobson is away, Donald E. Tope, professor of education, will be acting dean of the school.

## Singers to Give Evening Concert

Wednesday evening at 8:15 in the Student Union, the University Singers will present their annual home concert.

Max Risinger, assistant professor of music, will direct the selected group of 44 voices in a program which includes many of the songs they used during their spring tour, some newly learned pieces, a male quartet, selected soloists and four numbers by the Madrigal Singers.
