700 Scholarships Will Be Awarded

Approximately 700 scholarships will be awarded to Oregon high school seniors and college students by the state system of higher education scholarships will become effective next fall.

Both full and partial tuition and fee scholarships are awarded on the basis of student acmendations from the state system institutions, subject to the high school-college relations committee approval.

Full tuition and fee is provided only for teacher education at the three colleges of education at Monmouth, Ashland and La Grande. Partial scholarships are awarded for all institutions.

Names of recipients will be announced by each school on May 13, in accordance with policy established by the relations committee. Oregon will award 126 scholarships.

Trueblood's lecture will be composed of excerpts of his recentlycompleted book of the same title. This is his second book on Byron, the first being published in 1945 and entitled "The Flowering of Byron's Genius."
