

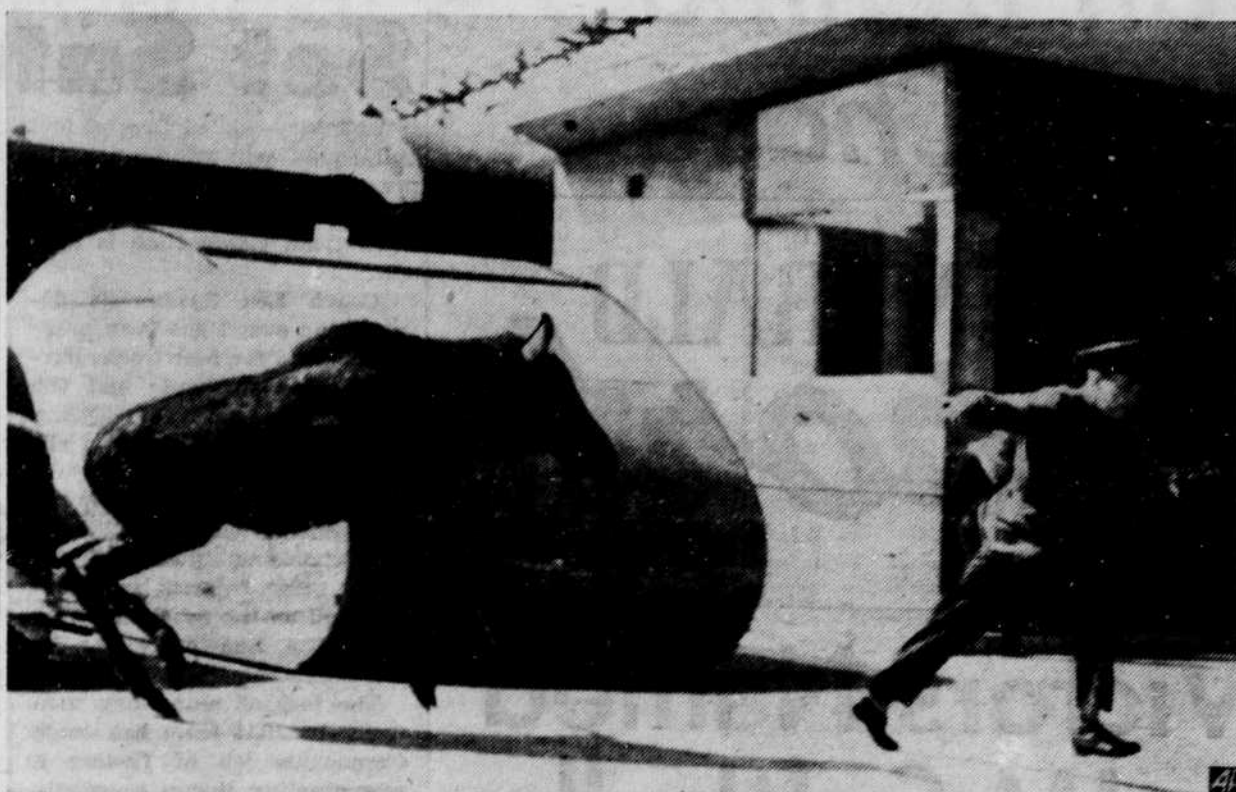
Luncheon Set On Old Campus Or Mac Court

Science Movie To Run Tuesday

Showing of "The Prior Claim," sound-color motion picture, has been rescheduled for Science 123 Tuesday at 7 p.m., it was announced late Thursday by Inter-Varsity Christian fellowship, sponsors of the film.

The 45-minute motion picture uses unique photographic techniques to reveal that modern inventions of man, including electronic advances, operate on the same principles that animals have employed since creation. Include the thermal equipment of the rattlesnake and spiders that live in submerged diving bells.

"Prior Claim," latest in the series of "Sermons from Science" films, is produced by the Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles, Calif., and is directed by Irwin A. Moon.

Other science films have included "God of the Atom" and "Dust and Destiny." They have been used in high schools, colleges and service schools as approved educational films for science classrooms.

The showing is open to all students and faculty members. There is no admission charge.

Lecturer Says Concept Good

The usefulness of the concept of irreversibility was discussed by I. Prigogine, in a Dad's room lecture Thursday night. Prigogine spoke on "New Aspects of the Thermodynamics of Irreversible Processes."

This concept can be applied to parts of a system, which cannot be treated with the second law of thermodynamics.

The second law of thermodynamics states that the order of a system tends toward a maximum.

Irreversibility also helps to show the compatibility of evolution with this law, he said.

Prigogine is a professor of theoretical chemistry and physics at the University of Brussels and a recent winner of the Francqui Prize for physics in Belgium. He is one of the many contributors to the field of thermodynamics of irreversible processes and has been an important contributor to other fields of chemistry and physics.
