Hal Moe's Oregon State cindermen help Oregon wind up its track schedule today when the Beavers, winless in ND competition this season, come to Hayward field to meet the defending division champion Webfoots at 1:30.

Oregon State can count only six returning lettermen and has had one of its poorest track years on record in contrast to the powerful Duck squad which Bill Bowerman will field this afternoon.

Fifteen letter winners are back from the 1954 Oregon squad that swept the ND dual meet championship without a defeat and edged Washington by one point to take the Northern Division meet title. In addition, Bowerman has been able to count on

fine performances from a fleet of sophomores that have been making mincemeat of dual meet records this season.

Bill Dellinger, Springfield miler who swept his way through ND, and Pacific Coast conference wins on the way to the NCAA mile championship last year, returns to lead a Duck distance crew that has few equals in the nation. The flying junior has doubled in the two-mile with the absence of school record holder Ken Reiser, an influenza victim. Both are expected to be

Reiser, a senior with three letters and defending ND twomiler, almost paced himself to an eclipse of his old Oregon record of 9:21.0 in the Ducks' first conference meet this season against Idaho. The slim Eugene strider was 200 yards ahead of the Vandals' Lou Gourley when he snapped the tape in 9:20.4.

A third member of Bowermans invincible distance dynasty is veteran Doug Clement, the speedy Canadian who has won three stripes in the quarter and half-mile runs. Clement was hampered by leg muscles injuries honors in the 8880-yard run.


