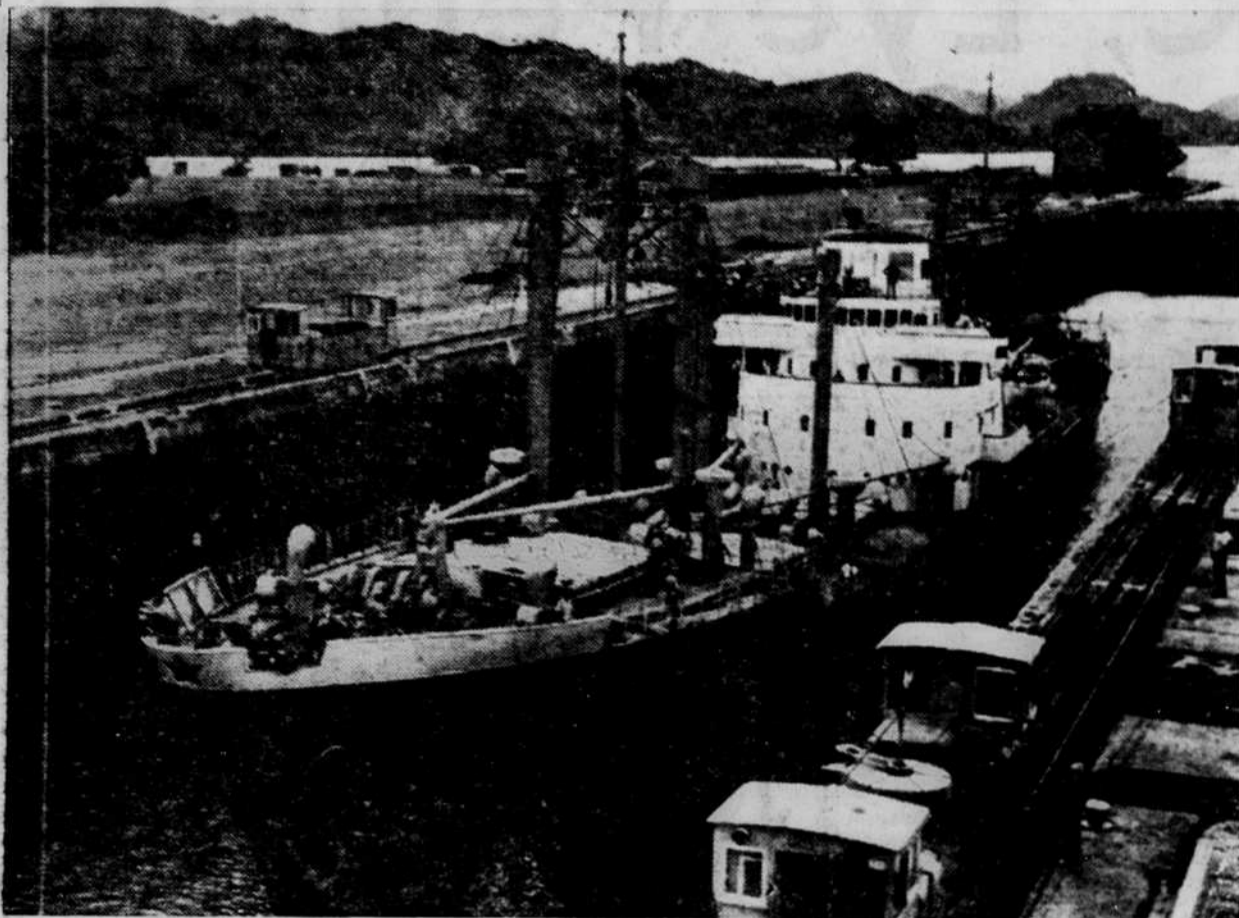


# USSR Vessel



U.S. ARMY SENTRIES stand on the forecastle, waist and flying bridge of the Russian freighter Taganrog as she moves through the Panama Canal bound for her homeland with a load of Cuban sugar. It was the first Soviet ship to pass through the waterway since 1949. Canal administration officials confirmed that special precautions were taken for the Taganrog's transit, although they did not specify what they were.
