NEW YORK (AP)-Ted Kluszewski, the famed "Mr. Muscles" of the Cincinnati Redlegs, finally has started belaboring National league pitchers with home runs and base hits in the manner to which they're accustomed.

Kluszewski slammed three homers last week to deadlock Duke Snider of Brooklyn for the lead at 11. He also collected nine other hits in 23 at bats-a .522 pace-and pushed his batting average to .321, good for a sixth place tie with Milwaukee's Johnny Logan.

The veteran Redlegs' first baseman hit 49 homers in 1954 and for a time threatened Babe Ruth's all-time mark of 60. For the record, both he and Snider are all even this season with the Bambino's 1927 pace.
