FINEST TRADITION

Millrace Undergoing Study To Restore Beauty, Value

Oregon Millrace, the University's finest tradition since the turn of the century, is now undergoing a study that is intended to restore much of its beauty and recreational value, which have been partially lost during the years immediately following World War II.

The first step in a plan of restoration took place during Junior Weekend, spring term 1955, when the Canoe Fete was staged on the Millrace waters for the first time in 14 years.

As student and faculty interest was much aroused by this celebration, the ASUO senate, Student Union board, and Educational Activities Budget board approved the spending of funds for an independent engineering study during the summer, and a recreational program for the race this fall.

Wilson Awaits Results

The study has taken longer than expected, however, and University President O. Meredith Wilson has awaited the results of this survey before giving final approval to the allocation of student funds on a recreation program, which is to include, as a start, a boathouse and canoes.

According to J. Orville Lindstrom, University business manager and member of the student-faculty millrace committee, Oct. 1 has been set as a tentative deadline for the completion of the engineering study.

Flow Too Slow

Briefly, the problem faced in a plan of restoration for the millrace include low water level, slow flow of water, and unsanitary conditions resulting from the slow flow.

The slow water flow may be attributed partially to the washing away of the river bank on the north end of the intake dam, partially to the 30 inch outlet pipe, and partially to a repair section in the upper channel which was constructed when a portion of the channel dike washed out in high water in the 1940's.

To overcome these problems, the engineers are considering the possibility of pumping water into the millrace. These pumps would be installed below the dam and would do away with a need for

the dam and part of the upper channel.

Outlet Considered

Another consideration of the engineers is the construction of an additional outlet, midway through the course of the millrace. Such an outlet now exists that carries part of the overflow to the Willamette river, before passing the millrace houses.

The ASUO senate has established the Millrace committee, which has guided the efforts since the Canoe Fete. Members are Sam Vahey, chairman; Lindstrom, Si Ellingson, Fred Cuthbert and I. I. Wright, faculty members; and Bob Schooling, Sally Jo Greig, Darrell Brittsan, Dick Gray, Kip Wharton and Jerry Maxwell, students.
