According to J. Orville Lindstrom, University business manager and member of the studentfaculty millrace committee, Oct. 1 has been set as a tentative deadline for the completion of the engineering study.

Flow Too Slow

To overcome these problems, the engineers are considering the possibility of pumping water into the millrace. These pumps would be installed below the dam and would do away with a need for
