

# Missing Women Found After Week in Woods

PORTLAND (AP) — Two women, lost for a week in a wilderness area of the Columbia River Gorge, were found alive and well Sunday.

Plucky Mrs. Avera Ferguson, 53, and Mrs. Bernice Sharkey, 75, both Portland, were trying to fight their way out of the deep underbrush when found by Sheriff's deputies.

In broken sobs the women related how they had been trapped in sight of civilization with no food and little water.

Mrs. Ferguson, the younger woman, insisted they were not lost. "I know where we were," she said. "I just couldn't get us out of there, but we certainly were not lost."

The two women had been missing since last weekend when

they went for a drive in the Larch Mountain area 20 miles east of here.

Their car, bogged down in mud on a side road, was found last Wednesday, and since then an intensive search of the area had been underway.

They were found attempting to climb hand-over-hand up the face of a steep cliff.

Mrs. Sharkey was in better condition than the younger woman. Mrs. Ferguson apparently had been taking some type of medication before becoming lost. Doing without it for the week had weakened her.

They were taken to a Portland hospital where their condition was described as "not bad at all." Both were expected to be released in a few days.

# Russian Baptists Pray for Leader

MOSCOW (AP) — Moscow Baptists, overflowing from their church to the street outside, wept and prayed Sunday night for restoration of President Eisenhower to full health.

"Save him, oh God, save him," cried many shawled women, young men and even children in the congregation of 1,500 as Pastor Elexei Karpov prayed for the President from the pulpit.

"Our own comrade Bulgainin, chairman of the Council of Ministers, and President Eisenhower have been great co-workers in the cause of peace and now... let us pray for the recovery of President Eisenhower so that he may continue his great work in the cause of peace," said Pastor Karpov.

Many women and grown men burst into tears when the pastor announced Eisenhower had suffered a heart attack.

# Ex-Strongman Peron Begins Political Exile

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Deposed dictator Juan D. Peron started into exile Sunday.

The onetime strongman who lorded over Argentina for 10 years sailed from Buenos Aires harbor aboard the little Paraguayan gunboat to which he fled for asylum in the face of a successful revolt.

As he left, the new revolutionary government started a systematic hunt for hidden wealth of members of his regime.

The gunboat, the Paraguay, pulled away from the dock late Sunday afternoon. The ousted President, a refugee on board since Tuesday, kept below decks.

The Paraguayan embassy said the little warship anchored three miles off shore to await delivery of the formal safe conduct from the new Argentine government. The government announced Saturday it was giving such a guarantee.

As the Paraguay sailed with Peron, the United States, Britain and Bolivia announced recognition of the new revolutionary administration as the legal government of Argentina. Twelve nations now have taken this step.

Although Peron and some of his closest associates found asylum, most of them in foreign embassies here, many of his collaborators were jailed.

# Portland Air Raid Evacuation Will Be Largest Ever Tried

PORTLAND (AP)—A massive evacuation test, in which some 1,000 blocks of Portland's busiest districts are to be cleared, will be staged by the city's civil defense agency some time this week.

The test, called "operation greenlight," is scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday, and indications are that it will be held in the late afternoon. The exact time at which the air-raid warning sirens will sound to start the evacuation is being kept secret.

Some 200,000 persons are expected to be in the metropolitan area when the test starts.

All traffic signals have been set to flash green along the evacuation routes.

All automobiles and individuals not having official business in the area will be expected to leave voluntarily. All business houses will be closed down.

Those persons who do not have automobiles and are unable to arrange public transportation are expected to walk out of the area.

Those in charge of the evacuation drill say it is the largest test of its kind ever undertaken. A number of observers from federal, state and community civil defense agencies will be here for the test.

# 2 Bodies Found By Coast Guard

SEATTLE—Two bodies were found along the Oregon coast Saturday after what the Coast Guard described as an apparent fishing vessel disaster.

The men were Jesse P. Keene, 48, of Everett, Wash., and Charles R. Russell, 40, of Florence.

A Coast Guard spokesman here said Keene's body was found floating in Winchester Bay near the mouth of the Umpqua River. It was fully clothed and wore two life jackets.

Russell's body was discovered several hours later on the ocean beach about 15 miles north of the bay.

Both men were understood to have been fishing aboard the 40-foot fishing vessel, Selma S. The Coast Guard said it did not know what happened to the boat.

"It undoubtedly was sunk, but we can't determine how yet," a spokesman said. "It is possible that the boat exploded and burned. But, neither man appeared to have been burned."

The Coast Guard continued its investigation of the case.

# Davis Attacks Opponents Of Present Power Program

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Clarence A. Davis, undersecretary of the interior, Sunday attacked what he called "political hogwash" used by "socialists" to magnify electric power into a national issue.

Davis said this is being distorted into a controversy between public and private power, which, he contended, it is not.

It is "between those who insist on federal power or none on one side and those of us who believe

in a combination of federal, state and local power on the other," he said.

Davis, in a speech prepared for the Lane County Republican women, said if opponents of the Eisenhower administration power program had their way, the Pacific Northwest could never wipe out its power shortage.

He said public power agencies and private utilities in the area estimated it would take three billion dollars in the next 10 years to provide an adequate power supply for the region.

Davis said this would require spending 300 million dollars a year for the Pacific Northwest alone compared to an average of 150 million dollars a year voted by Congress in the past 10 years.

# Blue Cross Insurance Available for Students
