Foreign Service Has Jobs Open

William Belton, veteran of diplomatic and consular assignments from Canada to Brazil, will be on campus Thursday to talk with young men and women interested in careers in the United States Foreign Service. He will be in Student Union 315 from 1 to 5 p.m.

Belton is one of 25 departmental officers being sent by the Foreign Service to nearly 200 colleges this month in an effort to recruit approximately 300 persons in the coming year.

Marshall D. Wattles, assistant professor of economics, reported that about 30 students expressed interest to the government representative last year.

Written exams under a revised system will be given December 9 by the state department for those applying for membership.

To be eligible the person must be at least 20 and under 31. He or she must have been a citizen of the United States for at least 10 years and if married, married to an American citizen.

Survey Depicts Fewer Teachers

A statewide survey to determine shortages in teacher supply has resulted in discovery of some startling facts. Thirty-one of 148 Oregon first and second class school districts began the current school year with fewer teachers than planned for because of the shortage of competent, qualified instructional personnel.

Many classes were dropped from the curriculum and many others are so over-crowded that effective teaching will be impaired, according to Albert Skaggs, Jr., Oregon Education association research director.

Nine first and second class school districts reported that it was necessary to double-shift students and that almost 2700 Oregon school children were involved in this emergency measure. Most of the districts reported that it was difficult to locate and hire teachers this year and that the salary schedule was a factor in securing new teachers.

Non-school facilities are being used for housing 45 classes in schools throughout the state, and when the report of the OEA was issued, 54 teaching vacancies were not filled.

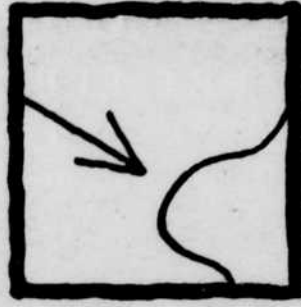


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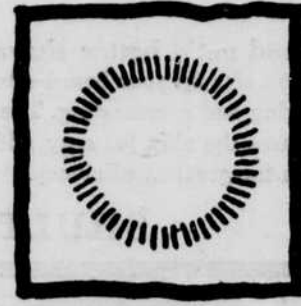

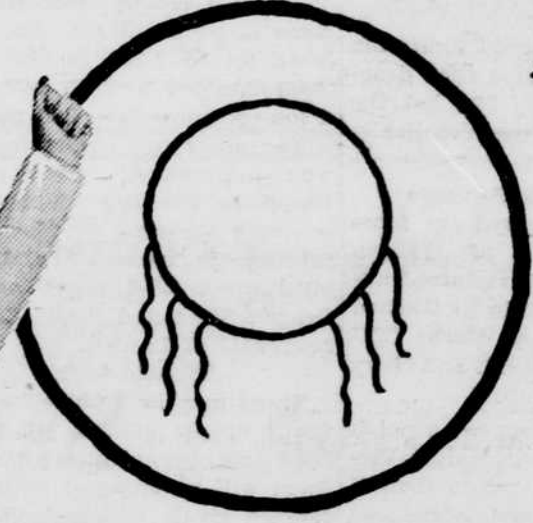
