

# Eisenhower Urges Russ Inspection OK

## Russ Playing Both Ends

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department reported Wednesday that the Soviet bloc may be preparing to offer weapons to Israel as a follow-up to a Communist arms deal with Egypt.

Top officials said any such Soviet bid would be a deliberate attempt to heighten the already dangerous tensions between Arabs and Jews in the Middle East.

### Would Expose Plan

However, they said, it would expose Russia's campaign to convince the Arabs that Moscow is their staunch friend and supporter.

A State Department spokesman, press officer Henry Suydam, told a news conference there were indications of a Communist arms-to-Israel offer, but refused to provide any details.

### Israeli Confirmation

A spokesman for the Israeli Embassy confirmed Russia has passed on a "roundabout indication" that it might be willing to sell some of its store of surplus weapons to Israel.

The Israeli government, he said, has made no effort yet to follow up the Soviet hint. He said Israel is relying on Western countries for any weapons needed to offset Communist arms deliveries to Egypt and other Arab nations.

## McFadden, 87, Dies

JERSEY CITY, N. J. (AP)—Bernarr MacFadden, 87-year-old physical culturist and former millionaire magazine-newspaper publisher, died Wednesday night in Jersey City Medical center.

MacFadden, a colorful exponent of strenuous exercise and periodic fasting, died after an attack of jaundice which his physician said had been aggravated by a three-day fast.

Until he entered the hospital Friday, MacFadden had lived a vigorous life. In his early 80s he still flew his own plane and played tennis.

## Relief of 'Fear, Suspicion' Hoped

DENVER (AP)—President Eisenhower formally renewed Wednesday a bid to Russia to help dispel "fear and suspicion" by combining both his own and a Soviet plan for mutual checking on military installations and movements.

Eisenhower made the offer in a letter to Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin, signed Tuesday, and delivered in Moscow Wednesday.

Eisenhower's letter to Bulganin was in partial reply to one from the Russian premier on Sept. 19 that used conciliatory terms but still dashed cold water on the chief executive's proposal that Russia and the United States trade military blueprints and permit mutual aerial inspection of military establishments.

### "Control Posts"

Bulganin plugged for his own idea of creating "control posts" at large ports and railway junctions and on highways and air fields to "prevent dangerous concentrations of troops and combat equipment" and "remove the possibility of sudden attack."

The President said he was encouraged that Bulganin was giving full consideration to his proposal.

"I hope that we can agree on it," he said, "not as a cure all, but, as I said at Geneva, to show a spirit of non-aggressiveness on both sides and so to create a fresh atmosphere which would dispel much of the present fear of suspicion."

### Lead to Progress

This, Eisenhower said he believed, would lead to progress with comprehensive plans for inspection, controls and reduc-

tions of armaments "which will satisfy the high hopes of our peoples, and indeed of all the world."

Then he added:

"I have not forgotten your proposal having to do with stationing inspection teams at key points in our countries, and if you feel this would help to create the better spirit I refer to, we could accept that too."

## Operations Start At Strike-bound Indiana Plant

NEW CASTLE, Ind. (AP)—Piston ring production was started again Wednesday in the Perfect Circle corporation foundry with national guard protection, just a week after a strike riot that wounded eight persons.

The CIO United Auto Workers pickets at the gate said they counted less than 40 production workers checking in, less than one-sixth the normal production force of 260.

## Russia Warns Iranian Alliance 'Endangers' Middle East Peace

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union warned Iran Wednesday her action in joining the pro-Western Baghdad defense pact endangers peace in the Middle East.

In a statement handed to the Iranian charge d'affaires here by Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, the Russian government declared it "attaches serious significance" to the move.

### U. S., Iran Reject

The United States and Iran both rejected the Soviet view.

Molotov called in the Iranian representative immediately after news reports here said Iran was joining Iraq, Turkey, Pakistan and Britain in the Middle East defense grouping.

### "Risking Enmity"

Molotov told the Iranian diplomat that by joining the pact Iran was risking the Kremlin's

enmity. Molotov also reminded Iran that the Soviet Union claims the right to move troops into the country if Iran violates the 1921 Iran-Soviet treaty. He said an Iranian lineup with the Baghdad pact would "contradict" the 1921 treaty.

The U. S. State Department hailed Iran's action as a step promoting peace and prosperity in the Middle East and in no way hostile or threatening to anyone. The United States has indicated she intends eventually to become associated with the Baghdad pact.

## Poland Shakes Finger at West

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Poland's Julius Katz-Suchy warned Wednesday the budding spirit of international cooperation will be seriously harmed if Poland loses its bid for the U.N. Security Council.

U.S. Chief Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., who is backing the Philippines against Poland for the seat held by Turkey, promptly countered that Poland is not fit for the Security Council.

WASHINGTON — Rep. Chudoff (D-Pa) Wednesday accused the Interior department chiefs of "brazen and bare-faced repudiation" of public power laws and demanded they change their tactics or resign.

TOKYO — Peiping radio said Wednesday only 66 Americans remain in China and all but 19 accused of crimes are "free to leave China any time they apply for departure."

CAMP FRIEDLAND, West Germany — Col. Gen. Erwin Jaenecke, fired by Hitler for evacuating the Crimean peninsula in April, 1944, returned to West Germany Wednesday night after his release from a Soviet prison camp.

ATHENS — The cabinet of Premier Constantine Karamanlis weathered its first political test Wednesday night by winning a vote of confidence 200 to 77 in a general policy debate.

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
