

National Science Foundation To Award 780 Fellowships

The National Science foundation has announced that it will award 700 graduates and 80 postdoctoral fellowships for scientific study during the 1956-57 academic year.

The fellowships are offered in the mathematical, physical, medical, biological, engineering, and other sciences including anthropology, psychology (other than clinical), geography, and certain interdisciplinary fields. They are awarded to citizens of the United States who are selected on the basis of ability in their particular field.

Graduate fellowships are available to those studying for either masters' or doctoral degrees at the first, intermediate or terminal year levels, and college

seniors who expect to receive a baccalaureate degree during the 1955-1956 academic year.

Postdoctoral fellowships will be awarded to individuals who have earned a doctoral degree in one of the above fields or who have had research training and experience equivalent to such a degree. Also, those who have an M.D., D.D.S., or D.V.M. degree and wish to obtain further training for a career in research, are eligible to apply for the fellow-

ships provided they meet requirements.

All applicants for graduate awards will be required to take an examination on January 21, 1956 at a designated center, designed to test scientific aptitude and achievement. Selection of graduate Fellows will be based on examination scores, academic records and recommendations regarding each candidate's abilities. The fellowship awards will be announced on March 15, 1956.

Applications for postdoctoral fellowships must be received in the fellowship office by December 19, 1955, and for graduate fellowships by January 3, 1956.

Testing Service Offers Exams

The Admission Test for Graduate Study in Business, required for entrance by a number of graduate business schools or divisions throughout the country, will be given on Feb. 2, April 14, and August 18, 1956, announced the Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the test.
