KVAL Programs Tell Charter Day Plans

Television for this week looks good. On KVAL today at 4 p.m. on "Guest Book," Beverly Brunton will interview University of Oregon officials who will tell of the activities planned in the observance of Charter Day.

At 9 tonight, "Where Were You?" will present actual scenes from World War II, including the declaring of Paris an open city in order to avoid bombing by the Germans, the debacle of Dunkerque, the Battle of Britain, the invasion of Norway, and the surrender of Holland, Belgium and Denmark.

Lovely and talented Ann Sothorn will guest star on "The Milton Berle Show" Tuesday at 8. She and Berle will present an original comedy, "State of Confusion," by Gore Vidal.

At 10 on Tuesday, "Playwright 56" will present Nina Foch as the only woman in a cast of 23 men in "The Answer," by Philip Wylie, a story of angels and H-bombs. Carl Sandburg called the Wylie story an exercise in imagination "reminding one of John Bunyan's 'Pilgrim's Progress'." Paul Douglas, Albert Dekker, Walter Abel, and Conrad Nagel co-star.

Wednesday at 4, "Guest Book" will feature interviews with the director of the Eugene Hearing and Speech Clinic, Duane Anderson, and Robin M. Overstreet, well-known local pediatrician. "Webfoot Feats" at 6:45 will bring Jerry Frei and two outstanding freshman football players from the University to the screen. Bob Anderson will discuss with them the personnel of this year's yearling squad and next week's game with Arizona.

"Ford Theatre," Teresa Wright portrays a woman torn between love and art as she stars with veteran French actor, Claude Dauphin, and Hollywood newcomer, Kerwin Mathers, in "Lady in the Wind."
