

Beta's Triumph, Sederstrom Wins In IM Playoffs

Beta Theta Pi and Sederstrom hall snared intramural touch football league titles Monday and moved into first round playoff action beginning today for the IM championship. The Beta's gained their crowd on a 19-6 win over Phi Kappa Psi. Sederstrom slid past Cherney, 8-0.

The Phi Psi's matched the Beta's on first downs, 3-3, but couldn't stop the Beta offense. Mike Jeffries rambled ten yards for the winners' first touchdown in the first quarter and flipped a pass to Ron Dodge in the second half. Dodge scored the other Beta TD on a 50-yard jaunt. Ken Kesey tallied the only extra point on another Jeffries pass.

Phi Psi came to life in the last period as Fred Bell tossed a pay dirt aerial to Gary Newton. The try-for-point failed and the Beta's held off a Phi Psi drive to win.

Bob Toyooka gathered in Ed Grier's pass for a Sederstrom touchdown and victory in league six. Jim McClellan added the safety margin when he trapped a Cherney back in his own end zone for two more points. Sederstrom led on downs, 5-2.

Sigma Nu and Delta Tau Delta ended a regular league game in a scoreless deadlock last week, but the Deltas couldn't hold Sigma Nu down Monday, as the Sigma Nu's launched an aerial attack that gave them a 28-0 triumph.

John Ramos did the passing and scored one touchdown himself for the winners. Neither team was in contention for league honors.

Today at 4 p.m. Sigma Chi takes on Tau Kappa Epsilon, Kappa Sigma vies with Sederstrom and Beta tackles Morton. Hale Kane draws a bye.

Cal Campus 'Hangs' Coach

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—The "Hang the coach" season opened Monday on the University of California campus.

An effigy of Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf, currently experiencing his worst season at the California grid helm, was found Monday morning hanging from Sather Gate, one of the campus entrances. Attached to the feet was a facsimile of a tombstone inscribed: "Waldorf was laid here October 15."

California's football team has a 1-3-1 record, the worst since Waldorf became head coach in 1947. The Bears were whipped, 21-0, by Oregon Saturday night.

Asked for comment at a noon luncheon of the Northern California Football Writers association in San Francisco, Waldorf said all he knew about the incident is "what I read in the newspapers."

"I guess you'd say it's one of the hazards of the coaching profession," he grunted wryly.

Hollingberry Asks Replacement As League-President

YAKIMA (AP)—President Orin E. (Babe) Hollingberry of the Northwest Baseball league said Monday he had been asked to be replaced as chief of the loop after the next directors' meeting, tentatively set for here, Nov. 12.

Hollingberry said the directors of the NWL, in their annual fall meeting here Saturday, had appointed a committee to recommend a successor.

The league's directors, Hollingberry said, voted to continue on a 7-team basis next season, although he said "we're anxious to give a franchise to an eighth member if we can find a good risk."

Missoula was reported a possible, but not definite eighth member.

Hollingberry said the league was solvent and had money in the bank. Individual clubs, he added, were all reported in good financial shape.

Hollingberry also said Spokane was expected to announce later this week that it had signed a tieup agreement "with a major or Pacific Coast league team." He would not go further.

The league president also announced the league's all-star team, which was composed of:

USC Publicist Claims Trojans Best on Coast

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Southern California has the best football team in the West, the school publicity man declared flatly Monday.

"There's no question that we're better than Washington," H. D. Thoreau told the Northern California Football Writers association. "We have the best team in the West and that includes UCLA."

Asked whether his statement expressed the feeling of Trojan Coach Jess Hill, Thoreau replied:

Not Sure if Jess Agrees

"I'm reasonably sure Hill wouldn't say it, but I don't know what he thinks."

The Trojans, ranked 16th nationally in last week's Associated Press poll, trounced sixth-rated Wisconsin, 33-21, last Friday night at Los Angeles. Thoreau was here as advance man for the team's game with California at Berkeley Saturday.

The Trojan spokesman was reminded of the remark made by Henry (Red) Sanders, UCLA coach, after his team's narrow 21-13 win over Stanford Saturday, that "USC will win the Pacific Coast championship."

Too Bad no Roses

"I agree with the statement," said Thoreau, "and I'll add that it's unfortunate the conference's best team won't be in the Rose Bowl this year."

Southern Cal, beaten by Ohio State at Pasadena last Jan. 1, is ineligible to repeat under the PCC-Big 10 agreement.

The Trojans' lone loss so far this year was to Washington, 7-0, in the rain at Seattle a week ago. Thoreau said the team's performance against Wisconsin last week was "the best ever by a Southern California team."

Stanford's second-half come-

back against UCLA was explained by Coach Chuck Taylor as being a case "of our kids snapping out of their early fright."

"We didn't change the defense much in the second half," Taylor said.

UCLA rolled up all its points in the first quarter, then failed to impress as Stanford scored twice in the third period and was knocking at the goal when time ran out in the last quarter.

Taylor said Sam Brown, Uclan tailback, was "the best I've seen this year."

"I dunno how you can contain him regularly," Taylor said. "I think Michigan State (38-14 winner over Stanford) has a better backfield but they have no one as good as Brown."

"There's no doubt in my mind that UCLA can be beaten. After all, we nearly got a tie."

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
