extreme form of the misunderstanding of our universities, Kenney continued. Fundamentally it is the result of snobbery, an unwillingness to vulgarize, and even more basically, it stems

from a confusion of research with scholarship."

"Most research is not communicable; most scholarship is," he said.

He said he hoped that in the future the universities would not be "all things to all men, and women too," adapting their curriculum to the whims of the students and the public without regard to their fundamental purpose.

Rather, he said, he would have them take a firm stand that "its central function is the increase of human understanding through the education of the young" and the communication of the new by scholarship.
