

IM Semifinal Round Gained

Sigma Chi, Beta Theta Pi and Kappa Sigma all rolled to impressive wins Tuesday in the first round of intramural championship playoffs. Wednesday's semi-finals will pit Hale Kane vs. Beta Theta Pi and Sigma Chi vs. Kappa Sigma, both at 4.

A Sig passing attack crushed Tau Kappa Epsilon, 39-0; Beta Theta Pi blanked Morton hall by a 34-0 count and the Kappa Sigs stopped Sederstrom hall, 19-0.

Led by Bob Walberg's passing, Sigma Chi soon solved the TKE defense and rolled up six touchdowns. Walberg tossed four TD aeriels, three extra point passes and scored once himself.

Kent Dorwin snared two of Walberg's strikes and Mike Speer and Bud Hinkson snagged one each. Hinkson passed to Dorwin for the final Sig score.

Fraternities Tie For Alley Lead

Wolverine Team, Terps, Sooners Top Grid Rating

Michigan, Maryland and Oklahoma still are the nation's top three college football teams Wednesday but after the upheavals of last week not even this formidable trio can be considered a cinch to stay up there.

Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, Wisconsin and Texas Christian all suffered their first defeats Saturday and dropped out of the first 10 with a crash.

Now the elite 10 lines up in this order:

1. Michigan; 2. Maryland; 3. Oklahoma; 4. Navy; 5. Duke; 6. Michigan State; 7. UCLA; 8. West Virginia; 9. Auburn; 10. Southern California.

Notre Dame fell to 11th, Georgia Tech to 13th, Wisconsin to 15th and TCU to 18th. Washington, 12th last week before their beating by Baylor, dropped out of the first 20 altogether. Baylor now is 16th.

Michigan, 4-0, journeys to Minnesota, 1-3, this weekend for the battle for the Little Brown Jug. The Gophers don't need added incentives when Michigan is the foe and they can take heart from the Wolverines' narrow 14-2 victory over Northwestern. Minnesota's only victory of the year was over Northwestern, 18-7.

Maryland, 5-0, visits Syracuse, 2-1, where the Orangemen still are celebrating their 13-0 upset of Army. The New Yorkers are big enough to make the Terps, 25-7, conquerors of North Carolina Saturday, hustle all the way.

Oklahoma, 4-0, aiming for its 24th straight victory and its 49th in the Big Seven, hosts Colorado, 4-0, in the only clash of all-winning teams this weekend. The Buffaloes have given the Sooners some tough games in the past, tying them 21-21 in 1952 and losing only by 13-6 a year ago.

Frosh Schedule Opening Contest

Oregon's frosh footballers will receive their first test this Saturday at Corvallis against the Oregon State Rooks. Game time is set for 2:30, either at Parker stadium or Bell field, depending upon the weather.

The Rooks are reported to have their strongest freshman team in years, including a turnout of nearly 100 for the first practice. The number is now down to around 75, but nearly all the high-school headliners are still on hand. The Rooks have many boys on their roster from California high schools besides many of last year's top prep performers from Oregon.

Duane Marshall, St. Helens; Terry Salisbury, North Salem; and Ted Miller, Milwaukie, head the list of prospects from the state of Oregon.

Duckling coach Jerry Frei has around 26 top prospects working out as tentative first and second stringers, but has not yet made any definite decisions concerning line-ups. Five players were singled out by Frei as having looked good in practice so far. Three linemen—end Ron Stover, tackle Jack Stone, and guard Leroy Todd—and a pair of backs—Charles Tourville and Will Reeve—were tabbed as looking sharp.

Oregon State will come to Eugene the following week for their second game of the three-game season. Last year the Ducklings downed the Rooks in both of their meetings.

Luppino Sparks Wildcat Eleven

Oregon's upstart Ducks, fresh from a handy 21-0 walkaway over California, started this week to hunt for an unknown quantity. The "X" factor is a sure-fire method of stopping Arizona's junior sensation, Art Luppino, who spearheads the Wildcat attack which Oregon faces Saturday at Tucson.

No team has yet found the combination to slow down the yardage-eating Luppino, who had a net rushing total of 1359 last year and is threatening to top that awesome mark. In addition, Coach Warren Woodson has twenty-three other lettermen, including three veteran quarterbacks.

Luppino and lettermen notwithstanding, the Wildcat winged-T attack has failed to gain much steam this year. Arizona owns victories over Idaho and Colorado A&M, but has lost to Colorado and Texas Western. They battled West Texas State to a 20-20 standoff.

The Oregon squad should be at

full strength for the evening tussle. Expected back to action after a lengthy layoff due to a leg injury is big tackle Harry (Hurricane) Johnson, who will bolster the small but plenty tough forward wall which stopped a Cal line outweighing it by 14 pounds.

The Webfoots had an opportunity to look at their reserve strength in the Cal game, and came up with several top-quality subs. Fred Miklancic, alternating at fullback with Jack Morris, picked up 38 yards in ten carries and smashed for the second Duck TD. Halfback Jack Brown went for 29 yards in six tries and ran back an intercepted pass for 30 more.

Also uncovered was the previously unnoticed passing arm of halfback Dick James, whose 36-yarder to Bill Tarrow took the Bears completely by surprise.

The Ducks leave by plane Friday morning, with a workout scheduled for that afternoon in sunshiny Tucson.

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
