Students Needed To Play Chimes

The chimes, which strike the hour of day and play music for special events, were installed in the tower of the Student Union during spring term of 1954.

Their estimated cost of \$3500 came from three sources: donations from the class of 1943 after the purchase of the memorial plaque in the Student Union; donations from the class of 1953; and donations from alumni leaders.

The 25 bell arrangement is made up of small rods, and the tones are amplified.

The chimes have been placed in the SU tower until a proposed campus chapel is built.

7. Honorary members will wear insignias every Wednesday.

In addition to the foregoing traditions, freshmen men have some additional duties. The Oregon seal on the Hello Walk will be scrubbed and polished by the male members of the freshman class. The big Oregon "O," located on Skinner's Butte, will be painted by the freshmen men.

Enforcement and penalties for the Homecoming traditions will be handled by two groups this year. Both the Order of the "O" and all living organizations are being asked to help enforce Oregon's traditions. Any violators are to be reported to one of these groups.

Penalties, which may be inflicted by either the Order of the "O" or the violator's living organizations, are a dunking in Fenton pool for women and hacking for men violators.

Cossack Chorus To Give Concert

Widely-toured Gen. Platoff Don Cossack chorus and dancers will appear at 8:15 Thursday at the Eugene high auditorium, sponsored by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

The program will include selections from Tchaikovsky, Lomakin, and Sakovich, as well as old ballads.

The group, which has given more than 6,000 concerts, including 2,100 in the United States, is composed of White Russian emigrants who are now American citizens.

Present director of the chorus, Nicholas Kostrukoff, organized the world-famous group in 1927 in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and since then it has visited 65 countries in five continents.

Tickets for the concert are \$.75 for students, \$1 for general admission and \$1.50 for reserved seats.

Police Still Looking for Portland Bank Thief

PORTLAND (AP)—Police still searched without success Tuesday for the lone gunman who robbed a Portland bank of about \$3285 Monday.

They said they had asked police elsewhere to be on the watch for two automobiles—one a black Cadillac with Michigan license plates, and the other a Buick with California licenses. The first had been reported in the bank vicinity prior to the holdup.

The other reportedly was used by a man who checked out of the YMCA Tuesday morning. Witnesses said one of the occupants in each car resembled the holdup man, police reported.
