

Beta's Collide With Sigma Chi In Final IM Tilt

Sigma Chi and Beta Theta Pi marched easily into the final game of the intramural football playoffs as they recorded lopsided wins over Kappa Sigma and Hale Kane Wednesday. The Sig's dumped Kappa Sig 20-0, and Beta handed the Hale Kane eleven a 26-6 drubbing.

The championship game will start at 4 today on the IM field.

The accurate arm of Mike Jeffries and the pass catching of Jerry Pool made the difference for the Beta's, as Jeffries threw for all the winners' points, and Pool caught three TD passes. Jeffries passed to Jim Laughton for both extra points.

Hale Kane hit paydirt first on a pass from Dudley Makahanaloa to Louie Montague. But the hard-charging Beta line, as well as several intercepted passes, held the Hale Kane attack to four first downs.

The Sigma Chi-Kappa Sig contest looked to be a thriller in the first quarter, as both teams halted long drives near their own end zones. The Kappa Sig's stopped a Sig march on the ten-yard line, and then launched one of their own.

Greg Galleon pitched out to Ray Hawkins, who threw a twenty-five yard surprise pass to Dan Cosby for the key play. But the Sig defense stiffened, ending the Kappa Sig threat.

The Sig's started the scoring in the second period on a pass from Bob Walberg to Kent Dorwin, with the same combination clicking for the extra point. Shortly before the half, Walberg climaxed another drive by sweeping right end for the second TD. Keith Barker caught a Walberg pass for the extra point, and the score was 14-0.

Final score came in the last quarter, as Barker wormed free in the end zone to receive Walberg's on-target toss.

Hoop Skeds Show Trips

Pacific Coast conference basketball teams will meet more inter-sectional opponents than ever before, the 1955-56 schedule revealed Wednesday, as released by the commissioner's office.

Playing under the new unified round-robin system for the first time in basketball, the Coast teams will play each other in regular season play from Los Angeles to Seattle.

Oregon State's defending champions, USC's 1953 title-holders and 1954 southern division kingpin UCLA will all take part in pre-season tournaments in December as well.

The Beavers will make their second trip to the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C., while SC will move into Houston, Tex., for the Southwest tourney. And UCLA returns to Madison Square Garden for the Holiday Festival.

Several teams have scheduled swings through the midwest, East and South during the early part of the season. Washington will travel to Kansas State, St. Louis and Ohio State in one long trip.

In other junkets, Washington State will play in New Orleans and Shreveport, La., and two games in Mississippi. Idaho will play Dayton, Kentucky and Missouri. And UCLA will play Nebraska and Wichita on its way to New York City.

Making trips to the coast will be such teams as Dartmouth, Wisconsin, Michigan, Northwestern, Baylor, Purdue, Denver and Iowa.

Ducks Take Spirited Drill; Lederman Practices Again

University of Arizona's Wildcats will meet a spirited bunch of Webfoots this Saturday if Coach Len Casanova's gridders carry the spirit of this week's practice field onto the Tucson gridiron.

Casanova ran his charges through the usual long, tough Wednesday practice yesterday as the Ducks put special emphasis on defense. Special attention was directed at the Arizona winged-T formation designed toward springing loose record-setting junior halfback Art Luppino. A large chunk of the Duck's offensive scrimmage was devoted to their passing game, with junior ends Phil McHugh and George Slender making a number of good catches.

Ace halfback Dick James was forced to watch from the sidelines for the third consecutive day with a minor injury received during last Saturday's California fray. Assistant Coach Roche assured, however, that James will be ready to go against the Wildcats this weekend. Roche added that last week's victory over California has raised the Ducks' morale to a new high.

SEATTLE (AP) — With quarterback Sandy Lederman back in good standing, the University of Washington Huskies honed their passing attack Wednesday night in anticipation of Saturday's Stanford invasion.

Lederman was dropped from the squad last week for "unco-

operativeness" and was reinstated Monday. Wednesday night the southpaw passing star from Santa Monica, Calif., was alternating with Steve Roake at quarterback in a rough scrimmage session.

New Date Set For NFL Draft

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — National Football League teams will make their "bonus pick" and select the first three choices from the 1955 college player crop sometime between Nov. 14 and Nov. 28, some two months earlier than usual.

Commissioner Bert Bell said Wednesday night that there was no secret about this meeting as expressed in some quarters.

"I sent out a bulletin to club owners informing them of the meeting and specifically stating that an announcement of the early draft would be made to the press at least two weeks before the date of the meeting," Bell said.

The commissioner, inviting all and sundry to come to the league office to see the bulletin, said the only reason he hadn't announced the meeting was because the date wasn't definite. It probably will be Monday, Nov. 28.

"I want to hold this thing in conjunction with our get-together to discuss plans for any conference playoffs that may be necessary and details for the championship game."

Transplants Top NCAA Figures

Monte Pascoe, a Denver boy who goes to college at Dartmouth, and Don Chandler, an Oklahoma Indian who migrated to Florida for his education, are the new leaders in two of the closest individual races in major college football.

When Pascoe caught eight passes against Lafayette last Saturday, he slipped ahead of Missouri's Hank Burnine in pass reception, NCAA Service Bureau statistics revealed Wednesday. Chandler's one 50-yard kick against Louisiana State gave him a slightly better season average than Bill Schmitt of Pittsburgh.

Pascoe Snared

Pascoe now has caught 21 passes to Burnine's 20. Other-

wise they're almost exactly even in the statistics. Burnine has a slight edge in yardage, 291 to 278; each has caught eight passes in a single game and two touchdown passes—and neither has been on the winning side this season. Pascoe's receptions have helped make Dartmouth's Bill Beagle the leading major college passer.

Chandler, a senior physical education student, has punted 13 times for an average of 47.2 yards and Schmitt 11 times for an even 47-yard average. The only other kicker to average better than 45 yards is Ted Rohde of Kansas, last week's leader.

Southern California's Jon Arnett went to the top of the punt runback class when he returned two Wisconsin kicks for 62 yards. He has a total of 210 yards on 10 returns. Arnett also leads in returns of all kicks with 19 for 420 yards.

Hohl Tops Interceptions

Dale Hohl of Holy Cross is the new pass interception leader with five, but he has returned them only 16 yards. Pat Levenhagen, Wisconsin, Tony Teresa, San Jose State, Lou Mele, Utah, Aubrey Lewis, Notre Dame, and Sam Wesley, Oregon State, have stolen four passes apiece. Claude Austin of George Washington has intercepted only three but has run them back 127 yards.

Jim Swink of Texas Christian retained the major college scoring lead by making seven points against Texas A&M. He has tallied 11 touchdowns and three extra points for 69 points. Arnett, with 14 points against Wisconsin, is second with 58. Other top scorers are Yale's Al Ward, 48; Arizona's Art Luppino, 43; and Oklahoma's Tom McDonald and Maryland's Ed Vereb, 42 each. Joe Mastrogianni of Wyoming is tops in extra-point kicking with 13 of 16 tries.

Freshmen Slate Cross-country Contests Soon

Tentative plans for a freshman dormitory cross-country competition have been drawn up by frosh athletic managers. According to head track coach Bill Bowerman, who will supervise the meets, the cinder contests will get under way on the first open Tuesday, probably within three weeks.

Not included in the intramural program, cross-country will provide an opportunity for frosh men to let off steam with a one-mile job. Races will start in the athletic field, with a turn around the quadrangle facing Straub hall a possibility, according to Bowerman.

Each dorm will enter four men, and scoring will be on the usual cross-country system, with the addition of a bonus deduction for each man who crosses the finish line.

If all eight dorms provide entries, the competition will be split into two elimination meets and one final.

West Virginians Front Offenses

For the second straight week, West Virginia's powerful Mountaineers lead the nation's major college football teams in rolling up points, yardage and advancing through the air.

This versatile offense has given the Mountaineers a 4-0 record and the No. 8 ranking with the select set.

West Virginia has averaged 41.3 points and 427 yards a game in trouncing Richmond, Wake Forest, Virginia Military and William and Mary. Passing has accounted for almost half of the yardage, 193.3, according to statistics released Tuesday by the NCAA Service Bureau.

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
