

# Navy Copter Lands Here



U. S. NAVY helicopter is scheduled to land on campus today. Sent by the Naval Air station in Seattle, the helicopter is part of an introduction program of the Navy. Accompanying it, there will be a team of information officers and a Navy truck, featuring Naval aviation equipment. (Official U. S. Navy Photograph).

A Navy helicopter was scheduled to land on the field in back of the ROTC building this morning at 10:30.

Accompanying the helicopter is a naval aviation information team from Seattle, which is bringing a truck display of aviation equipment, pictures, and aircraft models. The truck is a moving display of radar, hydraulic systems, aviation survival equipment, and a naval aviator's flight gear.

The members of the information team are Lt. Com. Jack

Hampton, Lt. Com. Donald Parker, and Lt. Art Plaut. These men will hold conferences with young men interested in naval aviation today and tomorrow, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. in the Student Union.

The team will also give mental examinations to the men each night, beginning at 6 p.m. The location of the tests has not yet been announced.

These tests are the only written test required for admission to naval flight training. There is no obligation involved by taking these tests.

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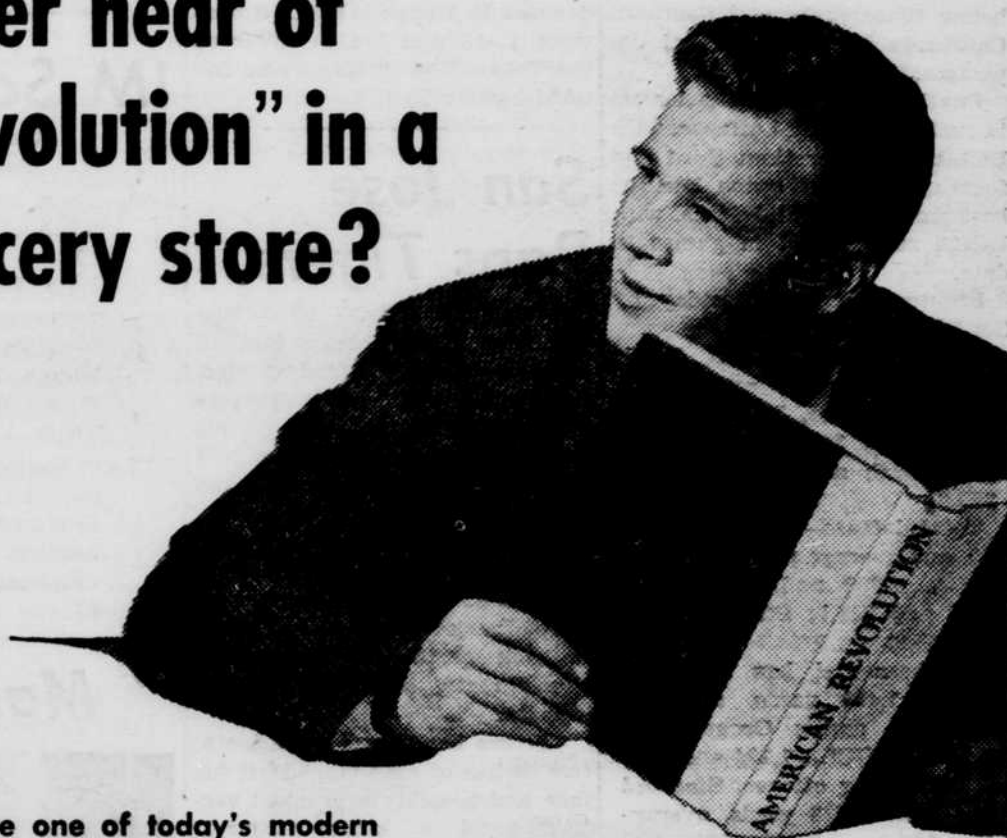
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## Ever hear of a "revolution" in a grocery store?
