

Applications Available for Danforth Foundation Aid

The Danforth foundation, an educational trust fund in St. Louis, Mo., invites applications for the 1956 class of Danforth graduate fellowships. The program is open to college senior men and recent graduates who are preparing themselves for a career of college teaching. The foundation would like ap-

plicants from areas of natural and biological sciences, social sciences, humanities and all fields of specialization to be found in the undergraduate college.

O. Meredith Wilson, president of the University, has named Willard L. Thompson, associate professor of journalism and business administration, as the liaison officer to nominate two or three candidates for these fellowships.

These appointments carry a promise of financial aid within the prescribed conditions to all fellows. A Danforth fellow is allowed to carry other scholarship appointments also.

The qualifications of the candidates are: men of outstanding academic ability, personality congenial to the classroom, and integrity and character, including faith and commitment within the Christian tradition.

All applications, including the recommendations, must be completed by February 15, 1956. Any student wishing further information should contact Willard Thompson, Allen 208.

Leppman Talks To Journal Club

Wolfgang A. Leppmann will speak at the first meeting of the Journal club on "Goethe's Reputation: The Mechanics of Immortality," tonight at 8 in the Faculty club.

The Journal club, under the sponsorship of the Foreign language department, welcomes all faculty members, and any others who are interested. Following the talk on German literature, and how the people spread or fought the influence of Goethe, there will be an informal discussion period. The meeting will be headed by C. B. Beall who helped found the organization eight years ago.

Leppmann, who is assistant professor of Germanic languages, was born in Germany. He took his B.A. and M.A. at McGill University, Montreal, Canada, and his doctor's degree at Princeton. He taught at Brown university before coming to the University of Oregon.

Byrne Named Director for College Project in Nepal

Charles Byrne, who resigned as chancellor in June after 25 years of service to the Oregon State System of Higher Education, will end his leave of absence and return to active service for the University in November.

Byrne has been named director of the University's educational project now under way in Nepal. He will be gone about 20 months, viewing institutions in Manila, Bangkok, and New Delhi, and universities in India before he

reports in Katmandu, capital city of Nepal.

The University is participating in a plan with the Nepalese ministry of education, to train teachers and to establish four-year teachers' colleges in Nepal. The government is attempting to organize the smaller universities into one comprehensive university, which will eventually include several professional schools.

Eight Nepalese educators are presently in Eugene studying in the University under this program. They will return to Nepal as nucleus members of the Tri-Chandra college, which is to be set up at Katmandu. Directing the program in this area is Hugh Wood, professor of education.

Byrne will continue work in some phase of education when he returns to Oregon after a year's leave of absence for his work in Nepal.
