

Five Lettermen Return As Borchers Starts Work

Coach Bill Borchers will set fire to his fifth autumn harvest of basketball hopefuls this afternoon with only five returning lettermen ready to blaze away at a month-long grind in preparation for the tip-off game of the 1955-56 season Dec. 2 with Oregon State.

Coach Borchers, starting his fifth season with the Webfoots, will depend heavily upon two-year lettermen Max Anderson, Jerry Ross and Ray Bell to bring the Ducks through a crucial round-robin schedule, the first in more than 30 years in the Pacific Coast Conference. Ed Bingham and Phil McHugh will be back for their second year.

Highlighting the Ducks' 16-game conference schedule will be home doubleheaders with California, Washington State and

Southern California with road games against Washington, Idaho, UCLA and Stanford. Following the opening Oregon State tussle, not to be counted in conference standings, Oregon will

host Colorado on Dec. 5, trek to Brigham Young for two games on Dec. 9 and 10, share a pair of doubleheaders with the Beavers on Dec. 20 and 21 at Corvallis and Eugene against Big Ten cohorts Michigan and Northwestern. ments against Portland University and the Washington Huskies will wind up the 27 game schedule.

Santee Denies AAU Charges

QUANTICO, Va. (P)—Miller Wes Santee said Monday he was "very much surprised" to hear he had been suspended by the Missouri Valley AAU and declared that he had never done anything to violate amateur athletic standards.

This nation's fastest miler, now a lieutenant in the Marine Corps, said he had not yet been officially informed of his suspension and he couldn't say yet whether or not he would appeal to the national AAU.

Should the suspension be made permanent, Santee, the nation's leading threat for the 1,500 meters in the Olympics, would be barred from competition.

Santee said the first challenge of his amateur status was made by a California newspaper which he said maintained that he was "wined and dined" royally on appearances at West Coast track meets.

PORTLAND (P)—Klamath Falls scored the longest touchdown of the season Monday. It took three days.

The Oregon School Activities Assn. ruled that the final score of the Grants Pass-Klamath Falls game should be 33-31 for Grants Pass, instead of the 33-25 for Grants Pass run up on the scoreboard at Grants Pass Friday night.

Klamath Falls thus won its protest, filed after the game.

The play that caused it all was a Klamath Falls pass in the final minutes. Ron Taylor of Grants Pass intercepted it in the end zone, and attempted to run the ball out. But he fumbled and Dan Taucher of Klamath Falls fell on the ball in the end zone.

Officials ruled it a touchback and gave Grants Pass the ball on the Grants Pass 20-yard line.

Hayes Accused Of Aiding Buck '11'

COLUMBUS, Ohio (P)—Ohio State Coach Woody Hayes Monday practically ignored published reports of a university investigation into purported gifts or loans by him to his players.

"Right now I'm interested in getting our fine football team ready for the Indiana game," Hayes said at his Monday press luncheon.

"I have not read the papers, and have not been notified officially of any faculty investigation. If I am notified of any such investigation, I will give the committee my fullest cooperation."

The Ohio State Journal, Columbus, said a recent article in Sports Illustrated magazine probably will hasten the investigation.
